

## Library Science School Launches Project

North Carolina Central University's School of Library Science is watching with special interest a new experiment at Athens Senior High School in Raleigh.

The library opened the school as Athens Community Library, operating simultaneously as a school library and as a public library.

Funding comes from the Wake County Schools, the City of Raleigh, and Wake County.

The combination library is the first in an urban community in North Carolina. A similar arrangement has worked well in rural community in Eastern North Carolina. "We can't claim to be the first in the state, but we are the first in an urban setting," says Ms. Geraldine McCall, who will be coordinator the overall program.

Dr. Annette L. Phinazee, dean of the NCCU library school, explained the university's special interest by noting

that both Ms. McCall and Ms. JoAnn Yarborough are graduates of the NCCU School of Library Science.

Ms. Yarborough will be responsible for the library's services to the general public. Ms. Fay Jones, a graduate of the UNC library school, will have responsibility for school library services. Mrs. Jones and Ms. McCall are employed by the Wake County School System.

Dr. Phinazee said, "This combination of a school and public library is unusual, but it is one that citizens keep wanting to see—using unused school space, keeping families together, saving money."

The one professional and two para-professional positions created by the non-school budget permit the library to serve the public and the schools six days a week. Citizens will be discouraged from use of the library on Fridays, when the staff is the smallest, but the library will be open for general use at nine each weekday morning and from 1 to 5 p.m. each Sunday. Closing hours on weekdays will vary.

## Nobel Prize Winning Physicist A&T Keynoter Student To Compete In Quiz Bowl

GREENSBORO—Dr. Phillip W. Anderson, who shared the 1977 Nobel Prize in Physics, will be a guest of the A&T School of Engineering on Wednesday, February 25.

Anderson is expected to meet informally with administrators, teachers and students and present a public talk in the evening in Merrick Hall, in conjunction with the university's observance of National Engineer's Week.

Anderson shared the Nobel Prize from the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences with John H. Van Vleck of Harvard University and Sir Nevill Mott of Cambridge in England.

Anderson's visit to A&T is being sponsored by the Bell Labs of Murray, New Jersey. The three prize winners are theoreticians within the field of solid-state physics, the

branch of physics which lies behind current technical developments, particularly in electronics. Anderson's work has resulted in a better understanding of why certain atoms such as iron are magnetic when dissolved in non-magnetic host metals and why other that might be expected to magnetic are not.

Anderson joined Bell Labs technical staff in 1949, and worked in the field of theoretical physics, concentrating mainly on studies of solid-state materials. He is a fellow of the American Physical Society and a member of the Physical Society of Japan, Phi Beta Kappa and Sigma Xi. He received the Oliver E. Buckley prize of the Academy of Science at Gottingen in 1975 and the Dannie Heineman Prize of the Academy of Sciences at Gottingen in 1975.

## Harvard Scholar To Appear At Chapel Hill

CHAPEL HILL—Dr. Eden Naby Frye, Associate at the Center for Middle Eastern Studies, Harvard University, will give a public lecture on the Middle East on Monday evening, February 23, at Chapel Hill High School. Time of the lecture is 7:30 p.m. and the public is invited.

The speaker, a native of the Middle East and a noted scholar on that area, recently accompanied TV reporter Dan Rather of CBS on his trip to Afghanistan.

The speaker's special interests are: modern

history, with emphasis on the Turko-Iranian world; the people and cultures of different ethnic groups in the Middle East; and the ideology of Islam and Marx.

Mrs. Frye's visit to Chapel Hill is for the purpose of conducting two daytime seminars at the High School for members of the faculty. These meetings have been made possible by a grant received by the School from the National Humanities Faculty. Chapel Hill High was one of 15 U.S. schools awarded \$25,000 grants by NHF.
