We built the illding ourselves; there as no contractor. My husund was involved in the instruction. Toddler's addemy is definitely a mily business."

Mrs. Whitted believes at one characteristic that stinguishes Toddler's mother day care centers the attention to each ild.

We feel that every child

is special and each child has to be happy," she said. "Our employees must love children and it is very important that they know every child. No appointments are necessary for parents to schedule a conference. I'm here 95 per cent of the time, and parents are welcomed to come in anytime."

Toddler's Academy employs 19 staff members and is licensed for 82 children. "The Center's qoal is to maintain a firstclass establishment. We worked hard to get to the top, and will work as hard to stay there.
