## RESOLUTION OF THE DURHAM COUNTY BOARD OF ELECTIONS CONCERNING CHANGE IN TIME FOR APPROVING APPLICATIONS FOR ABSENTEE BALLOTS

On February 20, 1990, the Durham County Board of Elections met in the Board office, 119 Orange Street, Durham, North Carolina, in regular meeting and adopted the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Durham County Board of Elections that the said Board shall meet to approve applications for absentee ballots for the May 8, 1990, Party Primary Election Tuesday of each week beginning Tuesday, March 20, 1990, Tuesday and Friday of each week beginning Friday, April 13, 1990, and ending Friday, May 4, 1990; and, in addition Durham County Board of Elections shall meet to approve applications for absentee ballots for the Party Primary Election Monday, April 30, Wednesday, May 2, Monday, May 7, 1990, for the 2nd Primary, if one is called, on the Tuesday and Friday of each week beginning Friday, May 4 and ending Friday, May 11, 1990; and, in addition on Monday, May 28, Wednesday, May 30 and Monday, June 4, 1990. The Durham County Board of Elections shall not be required to hold any of the said meetings unless, since its last preceding meeting, it actually has received one or more applications for absentee ballots upon which a ballot was not passed.
