Rayon is often treated so it has a smooth and lus-mus finish which gives it the look and feel of silk. Rayon is very sensi-tive to water. Many dyes

applied to rayon are not colorfast and will bleed which causes a shading to occur upon contact with moisture. In addition, manufacturers often add sizing to rayon in order to often and string to rayon in order to achieve a desired body or drape. Some sizings are water-soluble and washing will distort the shape of the garment.

most rayon garments be-cause a professional dry-cleaner is able to solve most of these problems. However, some garments whose care label reads "dryclean only" contain dyes and siz-ings that are water soluble. Never try to remove a

stain from rayon without first pretesting the fabric. Wet a small piece of the garment on an unexposed seam and allow it to air dry. If no dye or sizing change occurs, small stains may be removed in this way. Large stains should always be taken to an IFI mem-
