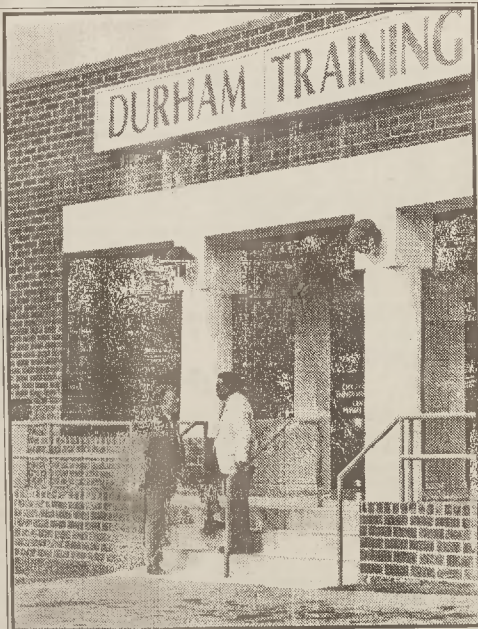

Custom Molders Is A Supplier Ford Mustang Previews Here

Weak sales made the Ford Motor Company think of dropping the Mustang from its production after 30 years. Over 30,000 letters were received in a very short time in support of the American classic.

In response, Ford representatives went across the country seeking companies to supply parts for a car that would be reasonably priced.

In Durham, North Carolina, Custom Molders, Inc., a minority owned injection molding company, accepted the task. The result a 1994½ Convertible Mustang GT with parts made in Durham by Durhamites.

On October 18, 1993 at the Custom Molders Plant on Camden Avenue in Durham, a sneak preview of the car was held. A yellow convertible Mustang drove up to the facilities and employees had the chance to actually see parts they produced on the car.

Hwa Yong Jo, president and chief executive officer of CME, reflected on what a monumental occasion it was for the company.

Franklin R. Anderson, CMI chairman and founder of the company, welcomed all who were present. The key speaker, Michael Jordan, executive director of Ford Sales, told the audience that he was the Michael Jordan that worked.

Mayor Harry Rodenhizer of Durham, who calls himself the recycled mayor, recalled that during his first term as mayor, Custom Molders was starting and has grown to the point where today it is the supplier for a large national automobile manufacturer.

All present had the chance to closely inspect the new car that was made possible with the cooperation of a Durham Company — Custom Molders, Inc.

The Durham Board of County Commissioners solicits applications for the following citizens' boards and commissions:

—**Domiciliary Home Community Advisory Committee:** Expired terms (expire September 1994). Subsequent terms are two or three years. The committee develops community awareness of domiciliary home needs and ensures freedom of residents' rights. Members shall have no financial interest, direct or indirect, in a domiciliary home and no immediate family member can serve on the committee.

—**Environmental Affairs Board:** One unexpired term for the Resources' position; term expires June 1, 1995. Specific duties include the following:

- advise the City and County with regard to environmental policy;
- educate the public and local officials on environmental issues;
- perform special studies and projects on environmental questions as requested by the City or County;
- study changes in environmental science and law; and
- promote intergovernmental and public/private cooperation.

—**Transportation Advisory Board:** Three expired terms. Members should be representatives from human service agencies, civic organizations, consumer groups, transportation providers and citizen volunteers (term expires October 1995). The Board serves as an advisory board to the County Manager and Board of County Commissioners on issues related to human services transportation policy matters.

—**Women's Commission:** One unexpired term (expires September 1995). This Commission is an advisory board on the status of Durham County women.

—**Youth Services Advisory Board:** Two expired terms (September 1996). Three unexpired terms (One expires September 1994. Two expire September 1995). Task: To assess the needs of county youth, evaluates funded programs and alerts the community about available funds and programs. Property tax listing must be current. County and City taxes do not reflect any delinquencies before an application is submitted. Appointments will be considered by the County Commission on Monday, November 8, 1993, at 7:00 p.m. in Commissioners' Meeting Room, second floor, Durham County Government Administrative Complex, 200 E. Main Street.
