FORGERY.

Pierre Longcamp, alias Louis Gauter, Paul Bonnet, alies Mills, and Louis Alliez alias Sigare, alias Minola, at the last session of the Mayor's Court, were tried for forging the check of the Sheriff of this county, signed Johnson and Renshaw, for 5,900 dollars. The extent to which forgery has, of late been carried, and the system which was formed for that purpose in this case, make its circumstances interesting. From the Testimony, it appeared that the prisoners, together with other persons entered into a general conspiracy to forge, and that they had several meetings in the city and county, to fix upon their plan of operation. It was at last determined that some of them should procure, information as to persons whose checks it would be proper to Reys, into their counting houses, take the balances from their check books, and procure other information ; others were to complete the forgeries a and others were to present the forged paper at the Banks for payment.

In case the person presenting the check should be apprehended, arrangements were then to be adopted to procure bail, and his acquittal-and if he should be convicted, the signatures of the in- rive at Raleigh the next day by 11 a m. spectors of the prison were to be forged, recommending the convict for a pardon.

After this general arrangement, the first check they thought proper to begin with, was that of the Sheriff, F. Johnston, Esq. usually signed Johnston and Renchaw. By means of false keys, they entered the Sherlift's office at night, and after several visits, they succeeded in opening by false keys his private desks ; they calculated the balance he had in the Bank which was about 7000 dollars-carried away some blank checks, upon the margin of which the Sheriff's name was primed, and a genuine check. for 1300 dollars, which had been paid and reparaed by the Bank. With this booty they prebared to forge a check for some thousand dol. fars ; but they then found that the genuine check they had takan, and from which they were to cupy, did not contain the word thousand. A night or two afterwards they returned to the Sheriff's office, when by means of their false keys, they again opened his desks made another calculation of his balance in Hank, which they found was upwards of 6000 dollars, and the number of the last check 649. They then forged a check for 5900 dollars, numbering it 651, which was preschool to the farmers and Mechanics' Bank and paid. Longcamp was then deputed to go to Baltimore and get three of the 1000 dollar notes received from the Benk, changed, which he did the next day.

As soon as the Bank discovered the forgery the cashier wrote to Baltimore and other places, to have the persons who might present these notes arrested ; particularly describing the person of Longcarop, who, from his very bad charnever, they expected had something to do with it congramp arrived at Baltimore the next day, with 3 notes of 1000 dollars each. He went to the Union Bank, and received change for one of thenotes. He then went to the Mechanics' Bank and presented one other to be changed ; while the teller was in the act of paying the money, the cashier was reading a letter, which he had just received from Philadelphia, apprising him of the forgery, and giving a description of Longcamp. INTERESTING LEGAL DECISION. In consequence of General Orders of his Ex, cellency Joseph Alston, Governor of this State, a General Court-Martial, of which Col. Young blood was Presiden convened at the Magazine, on Charleston Neck, on Monday, the 6th inst. for the purpose of trying, under the Rules and Arti cies of War, certain Citizens of Charl ston, defaulte is from the late detachments ordered out by the Governor to Stent's Point and to guard the Magsaint, who were charged with disobedience and mutinous conduct.

Numerous exceptions to the jurisdiction of the Court having been taken and overruled, when the trial had proceeded three days, a writ of Habeas Corpus was obtained by Wm. Crafts, Jun. Esq. in favor of Mr. James Lor b, one of the prisoners, which was amade returnable on the 18th ms'. before his Honor Judge Bay.

On the return of the writ it was moved to discharge the prisoner, on the ground that he was not liable to the Articles of War, and that the Court Martial was not organized agreeably to the aw for trying offences in the Militia. The argument continued for five days, and was managed with great ability and eloquence.

His Honor the Judge deferred giving his decision until yesterday, when, after an elabroate and eloqu at review of the arguments and the law, he ordered that the pri oner should be discharged.
