Reward of bravery and patriotism.—The sword voted by congress to Colonel Richard Johnson, of Kentucky, has been lately presented to him by the president of the United States.—It is said to have cost a thousand dollars. The manufacture by a Mr. Starr of Connecticut; and this production of his skill is said to be a brilliant example of American excellence in the arts. On the blade appears a short inscription signifying that "Congress had voted this sword to Colonel Johnson, for his services at the battle of the Thames, in Canada, Oct 5, 1813."

SPANISH TREATY.—The negotiation with Gen. Vives has been broken off. But it is said that the treaty, ratified by Ferdinand, has been sent over by an American officer, already arrived at New-York. A communication to congress on the subject was looked for about Saturday.

FOREIGN.—Advices from Europe begin to assume an interesting character, and, for the friends of peace, an alarming one. Matters have come to so great a height in the French parliament, and among the people, that the greatest violence and disorder seem to prevail. A proposition from the ministers to permit summary arrests, tantamount to renewing the old (*lettres de cachet*) had been treated with the greatest indignation. Whether the accounts exaggerate or not, there is no means of ascertaining until further time elapses.

In our last we briefly stated, that Negro *Herry*, who lately shot Mr. Robert Riddick, of Gates County, had himself met the same fate: We have it now in our power to state the particulars, so far as they have been sent us.—Harry was betrayed by one of his color, and pursued by a party of white men, in company with their informant. He was in a house, and made an attack on his pursuers as he ran out of it, by firing upon them. One of the party, however, soon came up with him, and presented his gun which snapped; which this monster disregarding, commenced an attack, by knocking him down with his gun, which stunned him considerably, but he soon recovered so as to enable him to contend with his adversary until the remainder of the party came up, when one of them immediately shot him through the body, he fell, and instantly expired.—Harry was the property of a Mr. Cotton, near Raleigh; for the head of whom, dead

or alive, the County Court of Gates offered a reward of \$200. It is expected, says our informant, that the balance of Harry's company, will very soon be taken.

SPANISH NEWS.

Boston, May 2.

Arrived, brig *Edward-Foster*, Couthway 35 days from Malaga. Left no American vessels 27th March. Passengers, C. S. Hinckley, Esq. bearer of despatches for government, from the American minister at Madrid.

By the *Edward-Foster*, we learn that the ministry in Spain had been entirely changed, & constitutionalists appointed; and the officers, civil and military, throughout the kingdom, with few exceptions, had been removed and constitutionalists appointed in their places; also, that all the ambassadors to foreign countries, except one, to the United States, had been displaced, and constitutionalists appointed.

The members of the Cortes of 1812, were collecting in Spain, and expresses had been sent to those at a distance, requiring their attendance at a general assembly to be holden at Madrid as soon as possible.

Ferdinand had issued two proclamations, relative to the assembly of the Cortes, the ceremony of his taking the oath to support the constitution, and the appointment of a provisional council.

On the 9th and 10th of March, a massacre of a considerable number of the inhabitants of Cadiz took place.

This caused great commotion in Spain; but at the time the E. F. sailed all was quiet. The constitution was finally proclaimed in Cadiz on the 21st March, in the evening.
