 It having now been ascertained by a survey made for that special purpose, that the road on the east or north side of the Yadkin river, is the shortest and most eligible route for a turnpike or portage around the narrows and Great Falls of this river, and the consequence, all or greater part, of the road coming down this great stream, and its branches, must be lodged immediately in the mouth of Uтары river at the point above offer it

 The Uтары joins the Yadkin directly at the Ferry, and is the nearest and most convenient and most of consequence to the Great Falls of the deposit above, be that place where it is impossible therefore, that any other route whatever, can possess the same advantages as the river, (Long's excepted) and it is a transport more produce than even that of the Fork (the point) affords one of the best harbors in the state, the mouth of the river forming a kind of natural canal for near three upwards (from its mouth) the water in all space being uniformly four to seven feet deep at common tide, and as smooth and still a mill pond, but when high (which is the case) it forms a most beautiful eddy near the retreat on the Yadkin side, twice the main and adjacent island, for any number of boats may swim the river. Another road will be opened, leading from the main turnpike to the upper end of the still water; this will shorten portage a little, and afford a warehouse to upper as well as the lower end of the plantation, the intermediate space of near a mile is a beautiful landscape, and delightful either to public or private life.
