# FROM THE NORTH CAROLINA SOLDIERS. FOR THE OBSERVER.

HD. QRS. 51ST ERG'T N. C TROOPS, Sullivan's Island, S. C., July 20, Messers Editors: Enclosed I send you a list of casual-Measure Editors: Enclosed I send you a list of casual-ties in engagement at Battery Wagner, July 18th The yanks shelled us for 11 consecutive hours and continued until the infantry made the assault at 7 P. M. We fought them until 114 P. M., repulsing them with heavy loss in killed, wounded and prisoners. Among the pris-oners are 10 negroes, one of them an Orderly Sergeant. They shelled us from three points, making a cross fre, sometimes at the rate of 20 per minute. It is impossi-ble to estimate the number of shell thrown. Gen Talia-fyrro, who was in command, (a No. 1 officer.) thinks from 4 to 6000. The odds against us were great; our ferro, who was in command, (a No. 1 obter), and from 4 to 6000. The odds against us were great; our artillerymen had suffered heavily during the day. The men of our reg't had been on heavy duty in the battery and slept but little for, six nights, and were completely and slept but little for, six nights, and were completely and slept but little for six nights, and were completely worn down from watching and fatigue, several fainting from excessive heat during the day. We occupied more than one-third of the line of defence and had 687 men in the action. Our line was unbroken during the en-tire fight: no yankee succeeded in mounting the para-pets defended by us. The filst and 31st N G regiments pets defended by us. The first and Slat NG regiments were the first infantry to fire on the enemy. The Slat were stationed some distance on our left. The enemy made a desperate assault on them; at one time had mounted our left parapet and planted colors four times. The battery colors had the halliards cut by a shell, which were soon repaired. 20 minutes after this the flag pole was shattered into fragments and its place supplied by the regimental colors of our reg't. The largest part of the infantry in the fort were North Carolinians (flat and Slat reg'ta) and fought well, as the list of casual-ties will show. "The reign of violence and bloodshed continued all day yesterday, notwithstanding the vigorous measures adopted by the anthorities to check it. The announce-ment of the suspension of the draft seemed to have oc-onsioned no abstemant in the popular excitement. As will be seen from our copicus reperts, frequent celli-sions between the military and the populace ecourred and numbers of lives were shorified, while an immension amount of property was committed to destruction. If sount of property was committed to d on the field of conflict. The poor negroes w

on the new of continut. The poor negroes were hanted, driven about and hanged, just as an the two previous days, and hundreds of the unfortunate creatures field terror stricken from the dity. There were scenes of violence to be witnessed in overy quarter. Around the Thirty-fifth street arsenel numerous skirmishes took place and extreme measures had to be adopted by the fillency suffortime. The multitude was exposed to the fifth of howitzers, and several persons were killed." In its editorial department, the Herald has the fol-lowing.

"There was little abatement in the display of violence manifested by the excited people throughout the city yesterday. Notwithstanding the order of the Mayor announcing that peace was restored, and the proclama-tion of Gov. Seymour, invoking the infuriated crowd to retire to their homes, promising protectien to the rights of the citizens and the vindication of the law, scenes as violent and more bloody than on Tuesday were enacted in various quarters of the city. The people seemed more desperate than ever, and the military force em-ployed, though strong, were repulsed in different local-ities. Under these circumstances the effusion of blood and the destruction of property were very great. The and the destruction of property were very great. The excitement was intense. It was more—it was undoubt-edly alarming and appalling. "There can be no doubt that authority had, for the
