WHEREAS, IT HAS BEEN MADE TO APPEAR to me that the terms of the Prociamation issued by me on the 26th ultimo, for the benefit of those members of our army who are absent from their colors without proper leave, may not have been known to all who might have de-sired to avail themselves of its merciful provisions, in time

for them to do so:
Now, therefore, I, ZEBULON B. VANCE, Governor of the State of North-Carolins, do issue this second Procla mation, extending the time limited in the former to the 5th day of March next. All such persons as above referred to, who shall have reported to their several camps by that day, will suffer no punishment for their past delinquencies To those who shall not have so reported, nothing can be promised except the severest penalties of the military law.
