Raleigh, July 25.—The adjutant general's department reports the mobilization of the twelve units of the national guard at their home stations today, upwards of 8,500 men, without a hitch and that the federal officers are already detailed and at work inspecting at the various stations with a view to the speediest possible work in mustering into service and the awarding of the equipment, all of which will be at the home stations. The expectation is that it will require something like two weeks to complete this work in readiness for the movement of the men to the concentration The war strength of the guard as now constituted, when fully enlisted will be about 10,000 men. The divisions include brigade headquarters, except the brigadier gen-eral and his personal staff; first and second cavalry troops; field artillery; three regiments of infantry; coast ar tillery; ambulance company No. 1; field hospital corps No. 1; hadie com-pany No. 1, and engineer train.


