Official Estimate Places at 15,-000 Number of Cases in County, With 200 Deaths:

The following interesting figures in regard to the recent Spanish influence epidemic in Meckionburg county were taken from a report made by Miss Eloise Rankin, assistant county su-perintendent of education, to be sent as requested to the state health au-thorities. She said the figures contain-ed in the report were given by Dr. C. C. Hudson, of the Charlotte health department.

department.

Of the 74,426 people of Mecklen-burg county, 47,426 white and 26,493 negroes, it was estimated that 15,000 were afflicted with the influenza dur-ing the epidemic. Of this number, ap-proximately 500 developed pneumonia following the influenza. There were 134 deaths in Charlotte due to the disease and about 200 in the entire county.

county.

The onset of the epidemic occurred on September 26 and was placed under control on or about October 30. There were 800 cases reported the first week and 7,000 in the first two weeks. The largest number of cases for any one period was between October 12 and 15 when 4,000 were reported.

Prior to the declaration of war on Germany there were 405 dectors in Charlotte and 19 in the other townships of the county. At the time of the influenza there were 71 doctors in the city and 16 in the county. The smallest number of physicians available for duty at any one time during the epidemic was 47. Three physicians fell victim to the disease, but no Staff Grand Knight Rae.
