

Minor Leagues' Future Appear Particularly Bright—Exhuming Dead Circuits in Prospect.

Now that the Hun has been properly spanked and placed with the "in Dutch" gang, the baseball fans of Charlotte are already dreaming of the balmy days of springtime as they regularly attend the "Hot Stove League" sessions talk over the prospects of a Carolina baseball league for the summer of 1918.

While no movement has as yet been made in this direction it is believed by some of the leading local fans that, if the Carolinas are to sport a league next summer, the time is now propitious to start making plans along that line.

By next April a large number of the Tar Heel soldier lads now with the colors will have been returned to civil life. These boys, in perfect health and with the native American love of sport, are going to want the American national pastime in their home cities and perhaps will start something on their own "hook" if those who stayed at home forget to arrange for amusement.

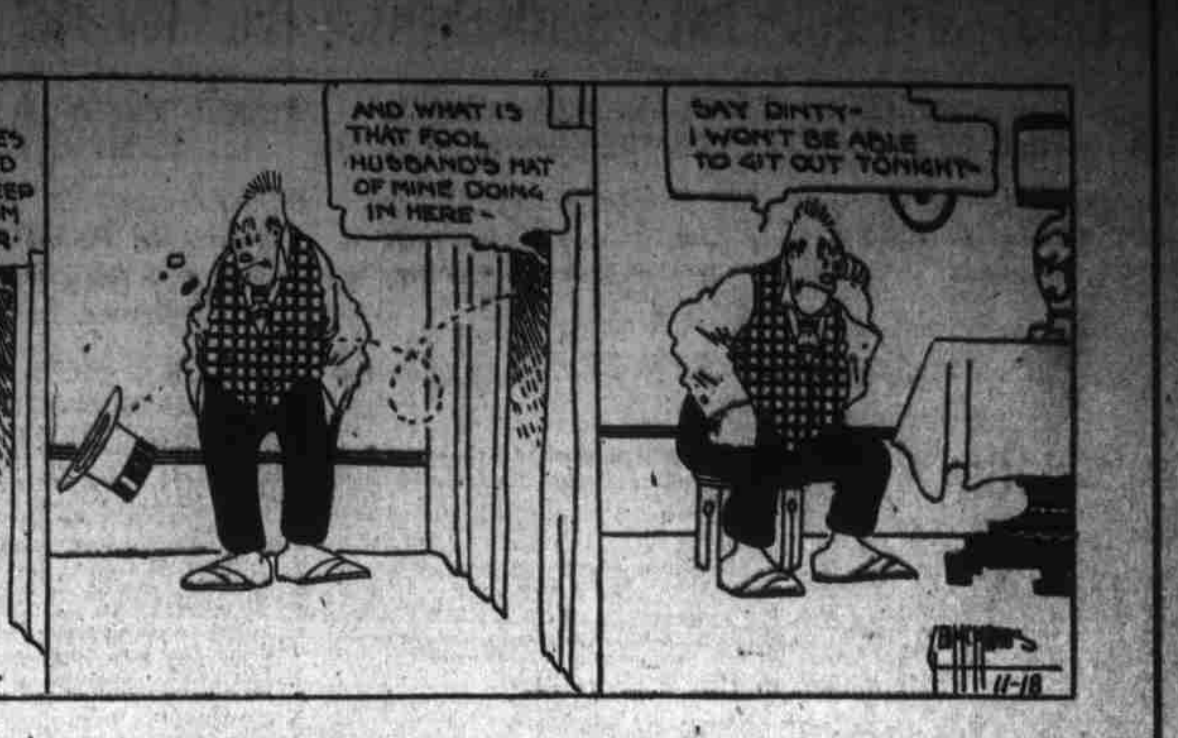
Although there still appears to be some doubt as to whether the major leagues will begin operations next spring, because of the fact that many of their star ball players will still be working for Uncle Sammy, there is no reason why such a cause should stop the minor organizations from playing their usual schedules. The American League without Cobb, Speaker, Jackson and Schalk, or the National without Alexander, Killifer, Kaufs or Gowdy, would indeed be handicapped and the crowd disappointed when these particular diamond luminaries failed to take their turn in the limelight.

The minor league situation is entirely different, however. In the smaller leagues, the Cobbs, Alexanders, Johnsons, etc., are developed, remain a season or two and then graduate to the ball players' paradise, the big show. It is up to the minor

leagues to develop the coming heroes of the game. Never in the history of baseball was the time more favorable for the smaller organizations to make money by the development of young ball players.

The war upset baseball organization just as it did all other amusements. Many of the stars of the major leagues before the world conflict, will not return to the diamond as the means of making a livelihood. Their places will have to be filled by the coming generation. It is a great chance for the little fellows who have backed baseball in the smaller cities to at last get some financial return for their years of effort, off-times a losing venture.

As for attendance there seems to be little doubt that with the enthusiasm which the returning soldiers will show in the game, added to the regular and natural number who follow the pastime, baseball should have one of the most successful years in its history.

The old Carolina league was forced to close operations because of the inroads of the war conditions made on attendance figures. That association has gone by the board and practically an entirely new league will have to be built. The proposition, if allowed to lie dormant, until late in the winter, will prove a difficult task but if taken up in the near future by the proprietors and gradually worked into an efficient and popular organization baseball should flourish in the Carolina league as never before.

FIGHTING MEN "CONSTITUTE INCOMPARABLE CHALLENGE"

President Martin, of Davidson college, chairman for Mecklenburg county of the united war work campaign, received yesterday the following telegram as transmitted through the Atlanta office of R. H. King, director of the campaign for the southeastern department:

Text of the telegram follows:

"Dr. John R. Mott, director general of the united war work campaign, received the following telegram from Dr. George W. Truett, pastor of the largest Baptist church of Dallas, Tex., who is now in special X. M. C. A. work among men of the American expeditionary forces.

"Our multitude of soldiers and sailors overseas constitutes an incomparable challenge to the patriotic and religious forces of America. These men now face the gravest tests of victory, demobilization and readjustment and urgently require the wisest and worthiest spiritual guidance. Less than our best is unworthy of our men, our country, our opportunities and of our God, who has saved civilization. The American people of America should dedicate her utmost for material a new earth wherein dwelleth righteousness."

MEMORIAL PLANNED FOR CUMBERLAND HEROES

Fayetteville, Nov. 17.—A memorial to the soldiers from Cumberland county who have given their lives in the great world war will be erected by the people of Cumberland in recognition of their heroic sacrifice and contribution of peace. The council of defense has taken affirmative action on this question, though the work will not assume actual shape until peace has finally come and all the casualties are ascertained. It is planned to erect a handsome memorial, somewhere near the center of the city, to perpetuate the memory of those who have fallen for freedom.

From the casualties so far reported, 15 or 20 Fayetteville or Cumberland county men have given their lives, approximately half of whom were killed in action or died of wounds.

Washington, Nov. 17.—Joseph W. Hamilton, grandson of Mrs. Willard W. Ashe, has been ordered to Camp Taylor, Louisville, Ky., to train for a commission. For six weeks he has been in the students' training school at the University of Pennsylvania. He is 19 years old, but six feet in height, and handsome. The selection of young Hamilton for Camp Taylor is considered quite a compliment here, where he has spent most of his boyhood days.
