Special Cable Dispatch.

PARIS, Nov. 22.—An international commission to study world disarmament and aid individual governments in an advisory capacity is the logical outcome of the Washington conference.

It is manifestly wrong to foster a belief that the present conference can succeed in laying down a law for universal disarmament. All the stateamen in Washington can do is to lay out a broad basis whereon fruitful agreements can be reached at some future date. period.

This groping of the public for freedom is the solidest thing upon which we can base the assertion that disarmament will one day be a reality. But public opinion is a lamp which can be lighted by many skillat some future date.

The disarrhament problem is composed of dozens of other prob-

lems, many exceedingly intricate and delicate and an attempt to solve
