It will be remembered that Mr. Pearson graduated last June at Princeton, N. J., in a class of more than one hundred, and bore off the first honor, delivering the valedictory address. He was highly complimented by the Northern Press. Mr. Pearson is a young gentleman of unusual talent, and bids fair to reflect some day credit on himself and the State. He is now engaged in the study of law at the school of his father in Yadkin county.

Address of a NOTED DESPERADO.—Ben Davis, a noted desperado of North Carolina, was arrested in Weldon last week.

Davis served in Captain Martin's company of cavalry during the last year of the war. He was then quite young and evinced no signs of the infamous future conduct of which he has been guilty. Soon after leaving the army he married a very respectable lady, and from that time his deprecations on the community of Northampton and Hertford have been frequent and outrageous, including forgery, cotton and horse stealing, shooting with intent to kill, and various other crimes. He has eluded or defied the officers of the law until last week, though a reward of \$500 was offered for his arrest by the State authorities.

His villainy is said to have driven one of his sisters mad, and to have caused her to commit suicide. It is hoped that the desperado will now be dealt with according to the law in such cases made and provided, and if such be the case he will not trouble the community for a very long time to come.—Petersburg Index.

ADDRESS TO THE PEOPLE BY THE LIBERAL GOVERNOR-ELECT OF LOUISIANA.—The following address was published in the papers of New Orleans on Monday morning:

"Fellow-Citizens of New Orleans, —Relying on the patriotism you have exhibited, I conjure you to bear yourselves this day with prudence, dignity, firmness, and moderation. Assemble as peaceable citizens to witness the inauguration of the only true and legal Legislature of your State. It is your right and duty thus to lend the moral support of your presence. Let no riotous or noisy demonstrations weaken the effect produced by your unanimity. Be calm as you are strong. In the midst of great political excitement incident to an attempted overthrow of your liberties by an organized conspiracy, show to the people of the United States a dignity of bearing worthy of you and of the great cause in which you are peaceably engaged for the maintenance of your liberties and constitutional rights. Be not alarmed, fellow-citizens. The Government of the United States will not exert its great power to put down and suppress peaceable assemblies of the people, but will rather protect them against violent assault, and from any quarter let it never be said that any act of violence on your part was the primary cause of public disturbances. I repeat it, fellow-citizens, be firm, but calm and dignified. JOHN MCENERY."

THE NEXT CONGRESS.—The Clerk of the House of Representatives has prepared, as far as he is able at this time, the roster of the next House of Representatives. The full membership will be 202. The Democrats must have, therefore, 98 votes, to break the two-thirds majority of the Republicans. Thus far the Democrats have 89 votes, and New Hampshire and Connecticut have yet to elect their members. The relative strength here given does not also include the members from Florida, Louisiana or West Virginia, these being subject to future decision. There is a prospect that five, or at most, six more Democrats may be added, making in all ninety-five, or three more than a third of the membership.—Baltimore American.

The census of France for 1872 just completed, shows the population to be 36,102,921, a decrease of 366,935 since 1866. The decrease is attributed mainly to the war, beside which cause there have been many fatal cases of small pox, and a falling off in the number of marriages.
