Later in life he dropped this slapdash style of romancing, and in the delicious Caxton novels displayed an entirely different style of writing. He merited and received a good deal of adverse criticism for the sham sentiment with which his earlier works abounded. Among other critics Thackeray basted him soundly. The criticism of Jeames Yellowplush zer on the "Sea Captain" covered that turgid play with such ridicule that it fell flat, and met with deserved illsuccess. He improved and refined his style greatly as he grew older, and some of his later works are models of elegance in writing. His "Lady of Lyons" and "Richelieu," despite many glaring faults of style, are fine dramatic productions, and will keep the stage. The collection of classic poems called "The Lost Tales of Miletus" abound with beautiful passages, and are faultless in polish and finish.
