Air-Line Depot. Work will soon be commenced on the Air-Line Railroad depot in this city. A force was at work yesterday preparing the grounds, at the foot of North Trade street, just beyond the Statesville railroad.

Additional Marshals. In the Senate on Friday night, the bill providing for the appointment of two additional marshals for the city of Charlotte, passed its several readings.

Motion for Removal. The Wilmington Star learns that a motion has been made by the creditors (or a portion of them) of the Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford Railway Company to remove the Hon. H. G. Onderdonk from the Receivership of that corporation. The removal is asked on the ground of incompetency and the motion will be argued before the Hon. D. L. Russell, Judge of the Superior Court, to-morrow.

IN MEMORIAM. At a called meeting of the Board of Education, No. 31, A. F. & A. M., the following Resolutions were adopted unanimously:

Resolved, That the shadow of death into which our departed brother has passed, cast a gloom of our hearts and across the threshold of our lives, and upon our hearts; the knowledge that we shall be permitted in this world no more to behold his well-rendered features, or to again clasp his warm hand, whose touch was as the opening of his generous and sympathetic heart is indeed a sad affliction.

BURYING THE EMPIRE. The last scene of all in the strange, eventful drama of which Louis Napoleon was the central figure, is described at so much length and with such a firmness of diction by the London correspondents of the New York journals, and seems to have been so imposing and grand, that one would hardly think from its reading that the obsequies were those of an uncrowned and exiled monarch, surrounded by but the shadow of his former splendor, and with barely a remnant of the power he once exercised.

WHAT NEXT? There was a mortifying scene, we are told, upon the floor of the House, yesterday, while the bill to increase the salaries of the Circuit and Supreme Court Judges was under discussion. Numbers of these high functionaries, it is said, were upon the floor of the House, talking to members and endeavoring to persuade them to support the measure.

The Troops in the South Ordered to March. We are informed in a dispatch from Washington that the President has ordered the U. S. troops now in the South to hold themselves in readiness to move out to the Plains, near Salt Lake City. This will be truly a move in the right direction.

The Washington correspondent of the New York Herald writing on Saturday says: It was rumored about the House this afternoon that owing to the recent exposures of the Credit Moblier Investigating Committee, and particularly to the poor state of his health, James Brooks would very shortly resign his seat. Sumner, Cox is mentioned as his successor in the event of his resignation.

A painful story of the attempt of a child of twelve years old to commit suicide comes from Ohio. The child, a boy, was adopted by a moderately wealthy family in Ohio, Ohio several years ago, and was uniformly treated with the utmost kindness and affection by his adopted parents. He was, however, taken sick with a fever, and though he recovered, the fever left him a cripple for life.

COMODORE MAURY'S DECORATION. For his magnificent studies in wind and current catography he received a number of medals and decorations, among which are these: France has presented to him a gold medal and the Cross of Commander of the Legion of Honor; Russia nominated him Chevalier of the Order of St. Ann; Prussia sent him the Grand Medal of Science, to which was added at the request of Humboldt, the Medal of Cosmos; Austria gave him the Grand Medal of Sciences; Denmark appointed him Chevalier of the Royal Order of Denmark; Norway and Sweden sent him a silver medal stamped to his honor; Belgium and Portugal sent him decorations; and the merchants of New York presented him with a magnificent set of silverware and \$5,000 as a token of their gratitude. -Sunday World.

Just previous to the attack he was engaged in conversation with a friend at Willard's Hotel, and was apparently in possession of his usual good health.
