It must seem very strange to Englishmen that servants of the people in this country not only tell lies to Credit Mobilier Committees but swear to them, and yet are neither fined nor sent to jail.

We said as far back as five years ago that, if a religious thought or sentiment ever did strike Robinson, it would either kill him outright or run him as crazy as an infuriated bed-bug, and sure enough it has.

Where the Burden Presses.

The N. Y. Tribune says: Men will draw comparisons between the corruptions of the Republican party and Tammany, notwithstanding the endeavors to pooh-pooh the latest developments. The St. Paul Dispatch censures its Republican comrades that the burden of the Credit Mobilier sin presses on the party because the party nourished and attempted to conceal it. The Dispatch says:

When the proof of Tweed's infamy was made public the whole Democratic party felt the effects thereof, although by much the greater portion of the party reprehended such acts as those of Tweed as severely as did the Republicans. Indeed, Tweed's overthrow and the subsequent endeavors to punish him are mainly due to the efforts of honest Democrats, notwithstanding which the Democratic party was justly held responsible in large measure for his sins. In the case of the Ore bit Millier corruption, more outrageous, if possible than Tweed's, the Republican party not only fought against the strongest proof until further resistance was futile, but now, when a majority of the party acknowledge the crime of the leaders, it is found impossible to punish the criminals, and impossible because the party so will it. The cases of the Republican who purchased seats in the Senate are after the same fashion in respect to their bearing upon the Republican party. Let it not be forgotten, then, that the party which created, nursed, and elevated to high place the Credit Mobilier Congressmen and corrupt Senators must be held to a strict responsibility for the misconduct of these its representatives.

CHLORAL IN ODONTAGIA.—A physician, writing in the Medical Times, recommends chloral as an efficient remedy for toothache. Being called upon immediately after the great Chicago fire to extract some aching teeth, and not having the necessary instruments—most of the dentists, too, having had their offices consumed—he prescribed twenty grains of hydrate of chloral, to lessen the pain and produce rest until he could obtain the needed forceps. To his astonishment, the ache in every case not only promptly vanished, but failed to return. It may also be stated here, on the authority of a German medical journal, that Dr. Rhen has succeeded in treating a threatening case of spasms of the glottis, in which the attacks were both severe and frequent, with chloral-hydrate. The attacks were by this means, Dr. Rhen reports, perceptibly lessened, and finally quieted. The case was that of a child seven months old. The medicine was well borne, and did not produce any disturbance of digestion.

THE EXPENSE OF RUNNING THE GOVERNMENT.—The total amount of the various appropriation bills passed at the last session of Congress exceeds the amount of the previous session about fifty-four millions of dollars. The details of the various appropriations are as follows:

Preliminary deficiency, \$1,929,839; Texan Border Commission, \$18,490; Pension, \$30,480,000; American and British Claims Commission, \$613,500; Indian, \$5,512,218; fortification, \$1,800,000; Consular and Diplomatic, \$1,311,359; Military Academy, \$344,317; legislative, executive and judicial, estimated \$19,500,000; naval, \$22,275,757; army, \$31,796,000; post-office, \$3,529,167; river and harbor, \$6,112,900; sundry civil, \$32,175,416; deficiency, \$9,242,861; total, \$195,410,900.

Civil Rights in Mississippi.

It seems they are just starting out in Mississippi under a State Civil Rights bill. A Jackson dispatch to the Memphis Appeal reports progress as follows:

The effects of the Civil Rights bill was shown last night. The Katie Putnam Troupe opened at Angelo's Hall, and preparation was made for a "quadrone gallery," but several "wards of the nation" saw fit to occupy near seats on the floor. No notice being taken of them, they did not enjoy their rights so much. Only one colored citizen appeared for his rights; he is a small grocery keeper. The barber shops have succumbed to the bill with one exception—Jake Wonders, a colored barber, who swears he will not shave niggers. The balance of the shops have lost the best part of their white custom.

A singular suit for \$10,000 damages has been brought against the city of Boston. When the Russian Duke Alexis was entertained at Masonic Hall by the exhibition of school children in December, 1871, a bust of Franklin was knocked from its pedestal by persons in the balcony, and struck a woman named Elizabeth Kendall upon the head, inflicting injuries which required medical attendance for a considerable time. There being some doubt as to the liability of the city, suits have also been brought against two of the Aldermen who were members of the Committee in charge of the festival, and their property attached. It is claimed for the defence that the injured person was present of her own free will, and ran her own risk.

The Kansas City News furnishes a volume of melancholy history in the following brief space: "To-day there is a man going about the streets of this city, ragged, dirty, penniless, subsisting on free lunches and the charity of gamblers, and has not slept in a bed for months, who, during the war, was one of the most dashing cavalry officers in the Union army, and was promoted from the rank of first lieutenant to full brigadier and brevet major-general for brilliant exploits on the field of battle, and who for a long time had a large and important command."
