Music.

Musical gossip is rife in New York. Mme. Lucca, it is now understood, remains in the country another season, having signed a contract with Maretzek to that effect, and will probably be associated with Lima di Murska in the prospective season. Signor Mario will depart for Europe on Wednesday afternoon next. The musical promise of next season is also fully set forth, most of the contracts having been signed. The lease of the Academy of Music for a period of ten weeks has been conceded to Mr. Max Strakosch, who will commence operations some time in September. The visit of Mlle. Adeline Patti to the United States has been deferred for a twelve month, and Mlle. Christine Nilsson will be Mr. Strakosch's bright, particular star. He has engaged Mlle. Torriani, a prima donna soprano, who is about to make her debut at Drury Lane Theatre, in London. Miss Annie Louise Cary, a contralto, who needs no introduction to the American public, has also been re-engaged. He will have three tenors: Signor Enrico Campanini, whose triumphs in London last year are no doubt remembered; Signor Victor Capoul whose value in the most popular operas of the Nilsson repertory cannot be over-estimated; and Signor Bonfratelli, a young singer whose performances throughout Italy have been exceedingly successful. He will have two baritones, Signor Maurer, who is about to appear at Covent Garden in London, and Signor Del Phuente, who has been heard in Italy, and who is soon to sing at Drury Lane Theatre. For the basso roles, Signor Nappetti has been engaged. Then Mr. Strakosch has been fortunate enough to induce Signor Luigi Arditi, composer and conductor, to take charge of the orchestra. Prominent on the list of new operas to be recited during the season are Verdi's "Aida" and Wagner's "Lohengrin," which will be brought out with great magnificence.

Our Confederate Dead.

The Ladies' Memorial Association was organized May 23, 1866. Its objects is to look after and care for the graves of all the Confederate soldiers whose remains repose within the city limits or in Wake county. Mr. Henry Mordecai having presented the association with two and a half acre of land for a cemetery it was prepared for that purpose in the Spring of 1867, when the remains of five hundred and forty-eight Confederates were removed and interred there.

By mutual consent Raleigh and Wilmington agreed and co-operated to remove all the North Carolina Confederate dead from about Gettysburg and one hundred and thirty-five were so removed. This was done by the aid of subscriptions from Hillsboro, Greensboro' (Electric Society), Louisburg and elsewhere.

The monument which has been erected in the cemetery to our here dead cost \$2,200. It is both a sad emblem and a talisman. The contributions for its erection were made by the bereaved and others in this city and vicinity. And added to this there was a generous donation from the kind-people of Baltimore. *Rat. Sentinel.*

THE PRESIDENT AS A FIDANCIER.

The President's late presence in New York is attributed to several purposes, chief among which is, it is supposed, that he desired to see for himself and ascertain from intercourse with prominent bankers and financiers, the proper policy to avoid the many "corners" in the money market; but this idea was very rudely disturbed, if an account of a reporter of the *Herald* can be credited, who says that while the President was eating a mutton chop on Wall street with a leading banker who was urging upon him to let the \$10,000,000 in greenbacks go upon the street and make the money market easy, he quietly replied:

"My dear sir, if these good people want the money market to be any easier and money plenty, why don't one million people put their hands in their pockets and each draw out a twenty-dollar bill? This would produce twenty millions of dollars, and if put upon the street would immediately make money very easy."

The reporter was left in much doubt whether this was a Presidential joke or meant in earnest to signify his indifference to the state of the money market.

WORKMEN ENGAGED IN A SAND-BANK NEAR COLUMBUS, O., HAVE EXHUMED A QUANTITY OF BONES OF STRANGE ANIMALS AND MEN, PROBABLY INDIANS.

From the description of human bones it is evident to scientific men who have the matter under investigation, that the race buried there differ materially in size and shape from the North American Indians of the present age. A skull and body bones have been obtained and great care is taken to secure the remainder.

METHODIST STATISTICS.

According to the latest collections of the statistics, the Methodist have now, in the United States 76 annual conferences, 13 Bishops, 10,242 traveling and 11,964 local preachers, 1,468,606 members, 14,006 churches, valued at \$62,333,247; 17,471 Sunday Schools, with 138,691 officers and teachers, and 1,278,559 scholars. Their reported benevolent collections for last year amounted to \$990,776.

Free Delivery of Mails.

Under the law passed at the last session of Congress, which goes into effect at the beginning of the next fiscal year, July 1, 1873, nineteen new postoffices will be added to the list of those entitled to the free delivery or carrier system. These include all those cities having over 20,000 inhabitants which have not had the free delivery system under the old law, and Charleston, with its 48,000 inhabitants, is at the head of the list. The others are: Scranton, Pennsylvania; Columbus, Ohio; Paterson, New Jersey; Kansas City, Missouri; Mobile, Alabama; Fall River, Massachusetts; Springfield, Massachusetts; Peoria, Illinois; Covington, Kentucky; Quincy, Illinois; Evansville, Indiana; Oswego, New York; Elizabeth, New Jersey; Savannah, Georgia; Poughkeepsie, New York; Camden, New Jersey; Davenport, Iowa; St. Paul, Minnesota.

There are ten other cities with population approximating but not quite reaching the 20,000 required by the law to entitle them to free delivery. One of these is Norfolk with 19,256 population by the last census. Under the old law 50,000 population was required to entitle a place to carriers, but the postmaster-general has allowed discretion, and several cities having less than that number were endowed with the privilege. Some of the cities now served by carriers have less than 20,000, but it is not proposed to withdraw the privilege.

UNIVERSAL LANGUAGE.

The New York *World* proposes to inaugurate the millennium of language by commencing with one subject, as for instance, the same coinage, weights and measures, in order to give a practical initial to the declaration of faith of the Hartford Courant, which paper, commenting on the President's message, wherein he has in some vague way given offense to Germany on the subject of language, says: "We ourselves believe that the child is born who will see the English tongue largely used by the 35,000,000 of Japan, and in fair way to supersede the cumbersome language that stays the progress of the 250,000,000 of China."

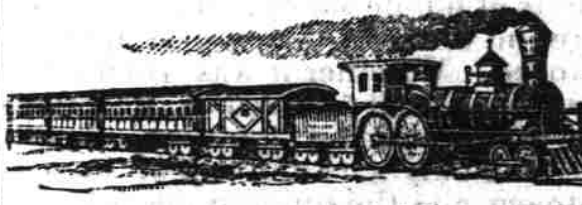
DINED WITH THE PRESIDENT.
