The Tyrant of New Orleans.

Gen. A. C. Garlington, of Georgia, has dramatized portions of Butler's despotic reign in New Orleans. We give below parts of a conversation between Mumford and the Beast, taken from the first act of the new drama.

[Extract from the Play.]
Enter guard with Mumford in irons.
(Gen. Butler (Addressing Mumford.)
In tearing down from yonder staff the flag,

"Which is the ensign of thy country's power,
Thou hast committed an act of treason;
Thou art not now on trial before me;

"That is reserv'd for other tribunals;
I would not wound thy feelings, or deny
The right to a fair trial for this crime;

"But I would, before the door of thy cell

Mumford. To discuss with the Commanding General,

"That question before I have a hearing,
Would seem a bootless waste of breath and time;

"After judgment, sentence is all that's left.
Gen. B. My opinion amounts not to judgment;
That will be passed by the court of trial;

"What I mean to say, is prima facie
Thou art guilty, and must acquit thyself.
Mumford. Manacled thus, silence becomes me most;

"But loose these shackles, and thou mayst hear me,
If such be thy wish, as to the motives
That prompted the act which thou call'st treason.

"Gen. B. Take his irons off (Done by guard.)
Mumford. At thy request, I now defend myself.
Against the odious charge thou hast prefer'd;

"I am not a traitor to my country;
'Twas not my country's flag this hand haul'd down;

"My country is my own Louisiana;
To her only is my allegiance due;
'Flung to the breeze in freedom's holy cause—

"And may its stars and bars and azure cross,
Continue to float proudly on the winds—
A terror to tyrants and the patriot's pride.

DOWN UNDER THE SEA.
How the Dead in the Atlantic Steerage Appear.
A newspaper correspondent, who went down to the wreck of the Atlantic yesterday in a diver's costume, says the hull lies well down on the port side, and is broken in several places from contact with the reef.

Fish were swimming in and out, feasting upon the dead bodies. Limbs are strewn around, having been torn from the bodies by the continual action of the waters, which when agitated, drive against ugly pieces of the broken hull that here project.

The correspondent then went to the company way of the steerage cabins, and found a hundred or more bodies lying in an immense heap, looking as if alive, with arms dislocated, eyes staring wildly, faces grinning and moving backward and forward with the undercurrent.

Children were clinging to mothers; stout men were clasping their wives, seeming to have met death with calm resignation. The scene was horrible beyond description.

The correspondent then went to the company way of the steerage where the men passengers were by themselves. Bodies of strong men, old and young, were huddled together on the stairway, with distended nostrils, gaping mouths, staring glassy eyes, giving some conception of the terror which seized them as they vainly struggled to gain the deck.

From another part of the vessel a view was obtained of the sleeping apartment, where piled up in heaps on the port side, were numbers of bodies of men, with bed-clothing strewn among them. From abrasion with broken stanchions and jagged, splintered woodwork, the flesh had been torn from the faces of many, while others are bruised and battered about their heads, which are red and bloody, contrasting horribly with the pale, livid features of the others.
