The Army and the Modocs.

Army officers think that the best way to deal with the Modocs is to let them go after them. One captain who has been out there lately remarks that he would not be surprised to see the Modocs capture one another if the government could offer \$5,000 for each body, and such cases the trouble of paying a bounty money to any one would be saved. But there is a general belief that an offer of \$5,000 a head would secure every Modoc within thirty days, because the settlers and friendly Indians would settle the business after the Indian fashion. So far as the Modocs are concerned there is no great trouble to be apprehended from them if they are left alone, because they will be apt to be charged with a spirit of revenge, and many of them will no doubt sacrifice their valuable lives in seeking revenge for their lost companions. The great trouble that is feared is from preparatory excursions of the small bands along the frontier, and if they get started the result will doubt be awful. General Sherman could not, with the tire frontier. The Indians would fight his soldiers, but would not fight him and kill the settlers. General Sherman is preparing, however, to do the best he can. The settlers are arming, and will under good service because they know that country, and friendly Indians will be brought into requisition their services be required. As in cases where distress is threatening, the cultures are flocking to the one, and unscrupulous traders are selling to the Indians for fabulous prices the most approved breech-loading firearms. On the whole the aspect of affairs in the northwest Indian country causes uneasiness here, and there is a settled determination to apply at once, without waiting for other systems of warfare, the service remedies that were applied by General Sheridan to the Piegans and General Crook to the Santans' outlaws. The point now the most perplexing is in regard to the best method of killing Indians without sacrificing too many white men's lives. But the consideration of that difficulty will not stay the hand that is lifted against the outlaws.

MAKE OTHERS HAPPY.—Who would not rather be a provocer of enmity than a bearer of sadness? Who would not rather breathe the human face with smiles than draw a veil of sorrow over it? He must be a saturnine fellow indeed who takes no pleasure in the pleasures of others, as he must be a wrong headed and wrong hearted man who does not feel in his own heart a glow of satisfaction when he beholds a merry childhood at play and youth running riot in its sunny seasons of delight. We may and will have our sorrows, but let us not mar the joys of others by wearing a morose face upon which is a graven deep the cares and anxieties we feel within. But let us rather be as the sunshine, shedding light and happiness upon the pathway of others; or like the roses, shedding a sweet perfume around us. There is a double pleasure, like what Shakespeare says of giving, in a kindly act—it brings pleasure to another's heart while securing it for our own. That most playful of all philosophers, the wise and witty Sydney Smith, said once: "All mankind are happier for having seen happy; so that if you make them happy now, you make them happy twenty years hence by the memory of it." Think of this and resolve that you will always try "to make others happy."

SHOOTING OF McNALLY.—On Friday night last Capt. Gallagher of the Infantry company, U.S.A. located at this point, while at the post office was attacked by a man in the garb of a soldier, in an unprovoked manner, and entirely unawares. Mr. Patterson and his colored boy intervened and pulled the man off of Capt. Gallagher. The man then ran up street followed by Capt. Gallagher, who, believing him to be a soldier, desired to identify and arrest him for an unprovoked attack. The man ran into an old cabin, and into a dark alley, where he was followed by Capt. Gallagher. He turned and seized Capt. G. by the necktie and endeavored to throttle him. Capt. G. broke from him and fired his pistol at him as he again attacked him, and then ran out of the alley. When the man was discovered he was found dead, and proved to be one McNally, who had been discharged from the U.S. service a few days before for general worthlessness, and fraud in enlistment.—Spartanburg News Era.
