Superior Court.—The following are the cases disposed of yesterday: S P Smith vs J D McIlwaine, entered a rule for a *revisé de novo*. Bank of Charlotte vs. R F and J M Davidson, verdict, that there was a tender and that the note was partly in renewal of Confederate note. S E Bratton vs John Allison, this case was in part compromised and set for hearing in future. In the case of W F Davidson vs. D G Maxwell, the arguments were concluded and the case given to the jury, but at this writing no verdict had been rendered. The Court adjourned over till Friday, to-day being election day.
