ALBANY, Nov. 17.—State Treasurer Phelps has defaulted to the amount of \$310,000. There is no chance of the State recovering any part of the stolen funds.

NEW YORK, November 17.—The wages of the street car conductors and stablemen have been reduced 25 per cent.
