FAIR OF THE CAROLINAS. FIFTH AND CLOSING DAY. Award of Premiums—Cadets of the Carolina Military Institute—The Mule Race, &c.

The most eventful week of the entire year for Charlotte, has just closed—a week which has, for months past, been looked forward to with the liveliest interest by nearly every citizen of the place.

Yesterday was the closing day of the Fair of the Carolinas, which began on Tuesday morning. We have nothing new to refer to, we believe, having reported in previous articles, the things on exhibition, so far as it lay in our power or so far as we have thought it necessary to refer to particular articles on exhibition.

The geological department was also full, and was one of the most interesting of the Fair. The credit for this is due to Mr. S. C. Johnston, who wrote and sent in all directions, gathering up specimens for exhibition.

The first thing in order yesterday morning was the award of premiums. This was read from the center of Floral Hall by Dr. F. H. Gloyer, to an interested crowd of exhibitors. The list will be published in the Observer so soon as it is furnished us, which will be in a few days.

At 2 o'clock the mule race took place.—This was the most amusing event of the entire week. Five entries were made, the riders all being colored. The mules were real mules. All of them, save one, were lazy and stubborn-looking brutes.
