HERMANN NAUMANN.—This gentleman, formerly an officer and instructor in the Prussian army, and recently of the King's Mountain Military School, is at present in Charlotte, and will instruct classes in German, French, Short-hand Writing and Drawing. Prof. Naumann comes well recommended, and we hope will have success in securing classes here. He informs us that he has already the promise of several pupils, and expects to experience no difficulty in getting others. German and French are now the popular languages, and an opportunity to learn them should not be neglected by those who have time and means which they can possibly devote to them.

STEAM LAUNDRY.—Perhaps no want is more seriously felt by the house-keepers and bachelors of Charlotte than that of a public laundry. Some time last spring one of our enterprising citizens began to make preparations for the establishment of such an institution, but for some cause or other he abandoned the scheme. Surely a laundry in our midst would pay, for certain it is that it would be well patronized by those who now pay high prices for washing, which is often badly done by washerwomen, who not unfrequently light upon some article which she thinks will fit some of her family.
