> New Jail .- It will be seen from the proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners, published yesterday, that it is probable that steps will be taken toward selecting a site for a new jail which it is proposed to build. If Mecklenburg coulty needs anything, it is a new jail and a new Court House. This jail is on one of the principal streets, just where it ought not be, and in addition to that is notoriously insecure. By the aid of a large gimlet and a pocket knife, a prisoner can escape from any cell in the building, unless he be chained to the floor. (Witness the escape of Baker who was confined in the most secure room of the jail.)

The necessity for a new Court House is Ten lines of solid minion type, or about scarcely less urgent than that for a new jail. The present structure is an antiquated looking and unsightly concern, and unworthy a great and wealthy county such as Mecklenburg is. A place like Charlotte, with its elegant stores, colleges and residences, should have a Court House to correspond with its other buildings. It is to be hoped that the Commissioners, in considering the propriety of building a new iail, will not torget the Court House question, which is almost as important.


