 The safe for the Farmers' Savings Bank has arrived, and was, on yesterday afternoon, hauled up from the depot.

 In tomorrow's issue will appear in full Senator Waring's able speech on the election of judicial officers, delivered in the Senate last Friday.
 Hon. Z. B. Vance, of this city, will, by request, deliver a lecture in Baltimore on the 17th of February. His subject will be "The Scattered Nations."

Capt R. P. Waring of the State Senate, and Col John E. Brown of the House, were at home Sunday and yesterday, and both returned to Raleigh last evening.
 Mr Ludwig re-opened the lager beer saloon under Cochran's yesterday, and is dispensing an excellent quality of beer, ale and porter. Those who drink these articles should call on him.

State Grange.—The State Grange Patrons of Husbandry will meet in Raleigh on the 18th prox., and we have been asked to say that delegates will be passed over the railroads to Raleigh and return for one fare.
 Fix the Bridge.—The foot bridge on the corner of Morehead and Church streets needs to be repaired and the planks nailed down. The looseness of the planks caused two ladies to be thrown from the bridge on Sunday, and by the fall one of them injured her foot painfully.

Selling at Cost.—Mr. E. Shrier has just had printed and is having distributed among his customers, a circular setting forth that he commenced on the 20th of this month to sell his stock of Winter goods at cost for cash only, to make room for his large stock of Spring and Summer goods.
 Personal.—Rev T J Gattis, Agent for Davenport Female College, is stopping in the city. He informs us that the present session opened with a larger number of pupils than ever before. This College is the property of the N C Conference of the M E Church, South, and is located at Lenoir, in Caldwell county.

The Graded School.—There are now 216 pupils in regular attendance at this school. The school is an enterprise which bears in a large degree upon the future of Charlotte, and should, therefore, be nurtured carefully. It will accomplish great good if it continues to be carried on as it now is. The public does not properly appreciate how important a matter is the free graded school system.

Oyster Roast.—The Raleigh News of Saturday, has this in its local department. It is of local interest:
 "Col R P Waring, the able representative in the Senate from Mecklenburg, was the recipient on Thursday of a couple of barrels of New River oysters from a friend in Newbern. "Opening wide his doors," at the Carolina House, a large number of friends, (one of whom we were which) gathered around the oyster pile, and such a time was rarely ever enjoyed by Western members. The company numbered at least fifty of the jolliest members of the General Assembly, and we do not remember ever enjoying an hour more pleasantly than on this occasion."

Lecturing on Agriculture.—Our neighbor of the Southern Home, Gen. D. H. Hill, has invitations from twelve counties to address the people on agricultural matters. The General is an experienced agriculturist, being the proprietor of the "model farm," which is in Gaston county, just across the river from the farm of Sheriff Alexander, on which was raised the corn which took the premium at Vienna last Autumn. Of course, this being the case, the General's opinion on all questions pertaining to farming, are entitled to weight. In an interview held with Gen. Hill yesterday afternoon, he stated privately to us that, while running the "model farm" he had been more successful in raising crab grass than anything else. However, he knows how corn, wheat, cotton, &c., ought to be raised.

Board of Aldermen.—The Board met last night at their hall over the Market. There were present His Honor the Mayor and Aldermen Tiddy, Houston, Davidson, Horah, Walker, McInch, Grier and Hagler. The bond question was the most important matter discussed so far as we could learn. After much discussion on this question, a motion of Alderman McInch to submit to a vote of the people the question of issuing bonds to the amount of the floating debt of the city passed, accompanied by an amendment offered by Alderman Tiddy that these bonds be not sold for less than 80 cents in the dollar. The election will be held at an early day as practicable, the people voting "bonds" or "no bonds." The amount voted on will be from \$16,000 to \$17,000, that being about the amount of the floating debt. We will endeavor to publish the full proceedings tomorrow.

Explosion of an Engine.—We learn from passengers on the C. C. & A. R. R., that a freight engine on the Greenville & Columbia Railroad, exploded near Saluda Old Town on Sunday, killing the engineer instantly, and mortally wounding the fireman. The engineer was Mr. John Lane, one of the oldest engineers in the South and one well-known in this community, having run for some time on the South road. At the time the explosion took place he was holding his watch in his hand. The unfortunate man was blown out on the road-side still held the watch, the minute hand of which had stopped at exactly at 12 o'clock.

The engine was in motion when the boiler burst. It was drawing a heavily loaded train up a steep grade, and it is supposed had on too much steam.
 Just as he was about to start out that morning, Mr. Lane remarked to a friend at the depot that that was the last trip he would ever make with that engine, he considered her unsafe.
 Disorderly Conduct.—On Saturday night and Sunday morning, a party of some fifteen or twenty young bloods from the country, created quite a disturbance in different parts of town, and carried on in an outrageous, disgraceful manner. They were all laboring under considerable loads of fire water, and made things lively in the localities which they visited. After making the streets resonant with their curses and drunken rhabdody, they repaired to that section of the city known by the police as "Canaan," in the south-western part of the corporation, where their orgies were continued and intensified.
 Here they rocked a house, breaking the glass out of the windows, and doing many other deeds of devilishness. One of the rocks thrown through a window, struck a female inmate of the house on the side of the head, inflicting a deep gash. Before they left this place, officer Healy of the police came up on them and dispersed the crowd.
 From this place they went into a house near the Fair Grounds, and abused the inmates in different ways. Among other things they tore up the clothes of the women, and in a general way behaved disgracefully.
 Several members of the party are known, and yesterday Justice Martin issued warrants which were placed in the hands of Constable Johnston who left at once to find and arrest them. Up to the time of this writing, he has not returned.
