**LOCAL DOGS.**  
St. Valentine's Day draws on apace. There were no cases in the Mayor's Court yesterday.

No clue has yet been found of the missing woman, Mrs. Hagar, who disappeared from her house near Beattie's Ford a few days ago.  
All the churches in the city except the Presbyterian Mission Chapel, which is still without a pastor, will be open for services to-day.  
We read yesterday in classing Col. T. M. Holt among the Directors of the "Commercial Bank of Charlotte." J. H. Holt, Esq., is the gentleman we intended to mention.  
There were 3 interments in Elmwood Cemetery last week. Two of the deaths occurred in Charlotte; the remains of the third person were brought here from Aiken, S. C.  
We learn that a young son of Rev. John F. Butt, of this city, about 7 or 8 years of age, fell from a fence yesterday afternoon and broke one of his legs. We have no particulars as to the occurrence.

**Needs Attention.**—Eighth Street, leading out from Tryon to the Cemetery, is in a most wretched condition. There is scarcely a foot of it that does not plead with dumb eloquence for the attention of the Street Commissioners.  
**Disabled Engines.**—Three of the finest engines on the Air-Line Railroad are now so far disabled as to be past duty. Two of them were smashed up in the collision yesterday; the third is useless for the present through having her pumps to give out on Friday.

Bright the lamps shone over fair young girls and brave boys, and soft eyes looked love to eyes which spoke again, and all went happy as a marriage bell, until the order was given, and the occasion closed.

To drop the language of poetry, and to come down to plain prose, we are gratified to state that the public occasion allowed the cadets of the O. C. M. I. was in spite of the inclement evening a decided success. The cadets gave a "Hop" as it is termed, and many of the young gentlemen and young ladies of this city were present. The affair was well-managed, and every thing characterized by that order, decorum, dignity and courtesy which are due military virtues.—The assembly room of the Institute, where the guests of the evening were received was most appropriately ornamented. The old flag of the Citadel Cadets of Charleston, S. C., which forms part of the festive colors hung gracefully from the gallery of the room. Whilst appropriate texts showed the teachings of the Institute to be that all civilization to be enduring must be permeated with the spirit of christianity. The cadets in their beautiful grey uniform vied with the civilians present in their courteous attentions to the ladies. The boys were gallant and the girls were pretty, and all's well that ends well.

In this connection we are glad to say that the Institute continues to increase its numbers. A number of fine, well-matured young men are reporting for duty, and the cadets are busily employed. There are now about 90 cadets on the rolls of the Institute, and fifty more are expected by the opening of the second term. The corps of teachers is soon to be reinforced by the addition of two more Professors, who will be young, efficient and energetic men, alive to the demands of the hour and in sympathy with genuine progress.
