Yesterday was a beautiful day; cold in the morning and evening and pleasant at mid-day.

Rev. L. McKinnon preached at the Court House last evening to his congregation—the Second Presbyterian.

E B Drake, Esq., editor of the Statesville American, was registered at the Central Hotel yesterday.

Callendar's Georgia Minstrels, who were in Charlotte not long since, were at Harlem, N. Y., on the evening of the 7th inst.

Gas pipes were being put in the new opera house yesterday. The pavement was torn up, and pedestrians had to "walk around."

The Second Presbyterian Church asked permission to prosecute a call for Rev. L. McKinnon, before the Presbytery of Concord. The Sharon Church presented a call for Rev. Wm. H. Davis, of Franklin, N. C., which was ordered to be placed in his hands.

An Imposter.—A man who calls himself Rogers, and who represents himself to be an agent of the New York Graphic, has been in this city for several days, soliciting subscriptions for that paper. We have seen notices in several of the State papers of a bogus agent for the Graphic who has been travelling around extensively, and we have good reason to believe that this is the man. If so he is a graceless fraud, and those who have paid him money will never again hear of their money or get the paper. If any of our citizens wish to subscribe for the Graphic they had better send the money through the mails or by express than trust it in the hands of Mr. Rogers. He is a large bald-headed man, with grey side-whiskers and moustache.

"Ten Nights in a Bar-Room" and the "Virginia Mummy."—The Theatrical Dramatic Troupe played again last night at Miller's Hall, to a good house. The first play was produced last Tuesday night and the acting last evening was a very decided improvement upon that of last Tuesday, according to the testimony of all those who were present on both occasions. It is not necessary to individualize, or we could speak of one or two actors who played with marked acceptability to the audience. Certain it is the play was well received; the frequent applause attested this.

"Ten Nights in a Bar-Room" was followed by the "Virginia Mummy." This was excellent, and this opinion was unanimously expressed. Here the ridiculous was brought out. The negro boy attracted universal attention, and brought peal after peal of laughter from the listeners. Those who took part in both plays, showed themselves to much more advantage in the last than in the first. We know that we express the sentiments of all those present in pronouncing the "Virginia Mummy" decidedly well rendered for amateurs.

Arrest of Ku Klux.—We learn from a passenger who arrived last evening on the C C & A R R., that two young men, R M Steele and W B Wilson, Jr., were arrested in Yorkville, S. C., on Monday, charged with Ku Kluxing. They were arrested by a United States Deputy Marshal and bound over in bonds of \$2,000 each, to the next term of the United States District Court at Charleston.

We Correct.—We found ourself in a hornet's nest yesterday morning, and never did a man get into an unpleasant box more innocently or more completely. The case is this: We spoke in yesterday's paper of the "Busy Bee Sewing Society"; saying that it was composed almost entirely of little girls. We are told that this is a mistake; that it is composed of grown ladies; that when originally started it was in the hands of little girls, but has now gone into the hands of the ladies of the Episcopal congregation. In addition to this, the printer had set up "ornamented work" when the copy read "ornamental work," and we paid the penalty of our own transgression and that of typus also. However, we make the amende honorable now, and hope that it will prove entirely satisfactory to the members of the "Busy Bee Sewing Society" (which is composed of grown ladies and not of "little girls.")

Mayor's Court.—Three young men whose names we are requested to suppress, were before the Mayor yesterday morning for making a row at the "Exchange" on Monday night. The evidence went to show that they went to that establishment, broke down the door, broke out the side lights and went in. Once in they made things very lively for the inmates, breaking some cups and saucers and otherwise conducting themselves in a very disorderly manner. The proprietress of the house and two of the women appeared as witnesses against the young men. The Mayor fined them \$5 each and discharged them from custody. Two of the "bloodes" were arrested on Monday night and lodged in the lock-up, where they remained until yesterday morning.

A stranger whose name we have forgotten, was also up for disorderly conduct on the streets. He was allowed to go after leaving \$5 for the city treasury.

Charlotte Gentlemen in Raleigh.—The Raleigh Examiner, of Sunday, has the following notice of three prominent citizens of Charlotte:

Capt. John Wilkes, formerly an officer of the United States Navy, but now of Charlotte, and a son of Admiral Wilkes, is at the Yarbrough House.

Col. William Johnston, of Charlotte, a well-known and eminently successful railroad man, a gentleman of literary attainments, as well as of great business capacity, is at the Yarbrough.

Ex-Governor Zebulon B Vance, of North Carolina, is at the Yarbrough. Personally he has more friends than any man in the State. Politically he is on the wrong and weakening side, and a great pity it is. Directed in the proper channel, his great talents and amiable nature would be worth to his mother State a thousand ordinary men. But living or dead, right or wrong, radical Tom, democratic Dick or conservative Harry, will ever go back on Zeb. Vance, personally; if they do they ought not to.

The compliment to Gov. Vance is a very great one considering that it is from the pen of a republican of the deepest dye. To give a compliment, however, cannot be bestowed upon this truly great man, North Carolina's most brilliant and distinguished son.

How the Second Presbyterian Church Can be Built.

The building of a Second Presbyterian church, in this city, has been determined upon, and before long, we are told, the edifice will be erected and the church firmly established. But the question, where the money is to come from to build the church, is one that has perplexed the minds of not only those who are and expect to become members thereof, but of the community generally. A solution of this proposition is the object of this article. And in the first place, it will be necessary to inquire what will be the actual cost of building the church, purchasing the lot, &c. As all things must have a beginning, I take it, that the people of the second Presbyterian church do not desire a fancy building, but one suitable for their accommodation at present, which may be enlarged as the congregation increases. Their membership is small now, consequently it would seem that an extensive building would be out of place. Neither is it at all necessary that their architecture should sound of all the modern improvements. "Costly their habit as their purse can bear" is the principle upon which this church should be built. Nor is it necessary that the building should be located in the business portion of our city; but let a lot be selected at some convenient point, accessible to the members. Now let us see what will be the actual cost of the lot in such a place with such a building upon it. The lot could be purchased for about \$2,500, and say the improvement could be put upon it for five thousand dollars, making in all about the sum of \$7,500.

Of this sum we are informed that \$4,000 has already been subscribed, which would leave a balance of \$3,500 to be raised to complete the structure. The usual way would be to raise this money by subscription, but we have an idea we wish to suggest to those who refuse to subscribe to this work on account of the recent panic, and yet who were able to attend the fetes of the Mardi Gras, at New Orleans this Winter. We are told that the fair to New Orleans and return, for this occasion is \$37 and that in this very same city, so recently afflicted by the panic, about 30 tickets have been sold. This would make the total amount of money expended for tickets alone \$1,110.

The expenses incurred while in New Orleans may safely be calculated at three times that amount, making the total amount of expenses in New Orleans, including Railroad fare, \$4,440. Now were this trip, or rather the expenses of this trip, this money which will be expended for a few moments' pleasure, devoted to the second Presbyterian Church it would complete the building and give a surplus for contingent expenses. We have said the cost of the church and lot would be \$7,500. Already \$4,000 of this amount has been subscribed. Add the expenses of the Mardi Gras trip, \$4,440, to the \$4,000 and we have \$8,440. Deduct \$7,500 and we have a residue of \$940, which would go far towards the support of the minister for the first year.

Let those who visit New Orleans remember these facts when they are called upon to subscribe to the Second Presbyterian Church.
