Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners.

The Board of County Commissioners met at the Court House, in Charlotte, yesterday, the 2nd day of March, 1874. Present, R L DeArmond, Thos Gluyas, W H Neill, M M Orr and T L Vail. On motion R L DeArmond was appointed Chairman pro tem, when the following orders were made on the County Treasurer:

Ordered by the Board that J C Taylor on account of blindness be exempted from working on the public roads for one year. Pay to Cyrus Stinson for making two coffins for paupers \$6. Pay to M E Alexander for making two coffins for paupers \$6. Pay to W O Riddick for tax return \$1. Pineville, 1874, \$10. Pay to same half fees in State cases, where papers were kept by Solicitor, \$3.

Ordered by the Board that W L Hooks be exempted from working on public road for 12 months on account of sore leg. Ordered by the Board that Jim McKee be exempted from paying his county poll tax for 1873, he being several years over 50 years of age and that the Sheriff be credited with said tax on his settlement with the County Treasurer.

Pay to R R Rea for the purpose of conveying David Gillespie and daughter to Caswell county, from which place they have recently come. Ordered by the Board that the Sheriff be allowed a credit on his settlement with the County Treasurer the sum of \$14.00, the county tax on \$1,080, being an error in Wilson Archer's tax of 1873.

Pay to Jos M Morris for making a deed for Lucinda Wallace, a pauper, \$3. Pay to Mrs Columbus Lentile for the present month to assist her in supporting her family, \$2. Pay to Mrs Susan Smith to assist her in supporting her family for one month, \$5. Pay to W A Ross for blacksmith work for Poor House, \$3.70. Pay to J C Bayte for beef for Poor House, \$1.23

On the petition of one-fourth of the voters of Pineville Township, it is ordered by Board that an election be held in said township on the first Monday in May to ascertain whether or not spirituous liquors shall or may be sold in said township.

Pay to Wm Maxwell for one bottle ink for office, \$1. Ordered by the Board that the tax of 10 per cent levied by the Trustees of Clear Creek Township on the property of said township to defray the necessary expenses of said township be approved.

Pay to F W Ahrens for plank furnished for bridges, \$12. Pay J T A Orr for guarding jail previous to the execution of Jos Baker, \$37.50. Adjourned to meet on the 10th inst.

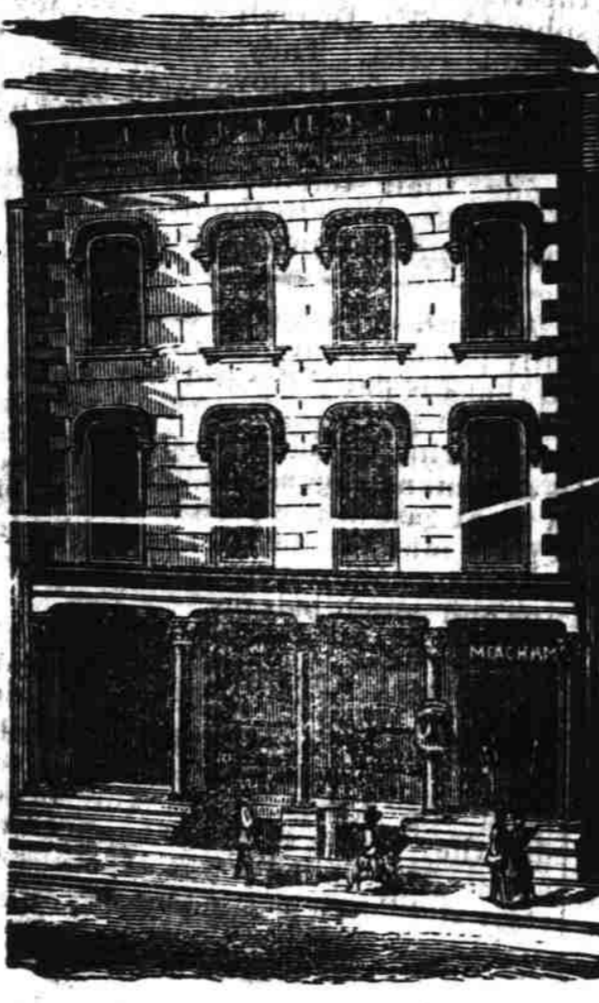
