"Old Probs" prediction about yesterday's weather, proved true to the letter. Very few country people in town yesterday. 130 bales cotton sold, nevertheless.

One grocery firm in this city shipped ten car loads of goods to customers on the C & A R R, yesterday.

There is an unfavorable letter in the Wilmington post office, addressed to H. W. Guion, Charlotte, N. C.

More appeals went up from Mecklenburg to the Supreme Court than from any other county in the State.

Mr. Hartley, the eloquentist who gave a literary entertainment in this city last week, read in Petersburg, Va., on Wednesday evening.

That distinguished Charlotte, Gen'l P. M. E. Young, arrived in Charlotte last night on the Air-Line train, and took quarters at the Central Hotel.

There was no change yesterday in the condition of Mr. William Gleason, who was stricken down with paralysis on Wednesday.

Yesterday was dark and drizzly, chilly, and generally disagreeable. (The people of Charlotte must and shall be kept posted in regard to the weather.)

The Air-Line Railroad is said to be in trouble, on account of the non-payment of interest on the bonds and the threat of the bondholders to enforce their mortgage.

The authorities of the North Carolina Railroad have about finished a side track from the trestle over Fourth street to the bridge over Seventh street on the same road.

A few nights ago a thief or thieves entered the kitchen of Levy Spencer, who lives on Second street, between Church and Mint, and stole everything eatable in it.

A gentleman who says he has good reason to know whereof he speaks, told us yesterday that his late father, \$5,000, have been invested in the Kentucky Lottery by citizens of Charlotte.

The query, "who teaches school in Kernersville?" propounded frequently through the Winston Sentinel, has developed the fact that Col. W. Beaumont Clarkson, formerly of Charlotte does. Kernersville is in Forsyth county.

Fell off a Bridge.—A negro was driving two mules which were drawing a wagon loaded with wood, from Tryon street into First, yesterday afternoon, when one of the mules made a misstep while going up the bridge and dropped over the gutter. The distance from the bridge to the ground was not very great, where the mule got off, and it received no injury to speak of, though the wagon was backed and the mule extricated with some difficulty.

Railroad Suit.—In the Supreme Court of the State, on Thursday, the cause of the Atlantic, Tennessee & Ohio Railroad Company et al, vs S A Sharpe et al, from Iredell, was argued. R F Armfield and W P Caldwell for plaintiffs; Jones & Johnston, R Barringer, D M Furches and McCorkle & Bailey for defendants.

Carolina Central Railway.—The Eastern Division of the Carolina Central Railway is now completed three miles beyond Wadesboro. The contractors expect to get through Bogran's cut by the middle of April, and then we are promised a rate of progress estimated at half a mile per day. To our Charlotte friends we say: "Look out for the locomotive when the bells ring." Wilmington Star.

Hon Z B Vance.—We learn that an effort will be made in a few days, by the Hebrew citizens of this place, to induce Hon. Zebulon B Vance to deliver his lecture on the Jewish Race in this city. The object of the movement is to aid in raising funds to build a new synagogue. We believe that the effort, should they procure Mr Vance, will redound in great success.—Petersburg Index & Appeal.

Scholarships in the C. M. I.—Col J P Thomas, Superintendent of the Carolina Military Institute, has placed at the disposal of the N C State Grange four scholarships in his Institute.

The Raleigh News says that recommendations from Masters of Subordinate Granges for candidates for the above named scholarships will be received as follows: Two from the eastern section of the State, one from the central and one from the western section, at the office of the Secretary of N C State Grange, at Fayetteville, N. C, by or before 10th of April next.

Complimentary.—A Southern gentleman who has been traveling extensively, and who stopped here for a rest, told us today or two since that Charlotte was the most thoroughly live inland place of its size he had ever seen; that everybody here seemed to be at work, and that the place must one day become a large city. He was surprised at the amount of trade done here, and remarked that an air of business seemed to pervade everything. This is very complimentary to our little city, but it is the verdict of all strangers who visit it and stay long enough to form an intelligent opinion.

Delay of the Atlantic Train.—The mail and passenger train on the Air-Line Railroad, due here about 8 o'clock, A. M., was five hours behind time yesterday. The delay was caused by the engine running off the track in the yard as the train was leaving Atlanta for Charlotte, on Thursday evening. By the time the engine was replaced the night was so far advanced that it was deemed advisable to remain in Atlanta until morning. This was done and the train left that city yesterday morning at 7 o'clock. There being other trains on the track it was necessary to run slowly, hence the late arrival of the train last night.

Heavy Shipments of Guano.—There are not less than seventy-four car-loads of guano lying at the N C R R depot and at the Air Line Junction, awaiting shipment over the Air Line. This guano is for different points on the road, but most of it is billed for Georgia. It is to fertilize the lands for the cotton crops to be planted this Spring, and many of these crops have no doubt been pledged for money where-with to purchase it. This very thing has nearly ruined the South, but the farmers persist in learning nothing by experience, planting all in cotton and trusting in Providence to provide them bread and pay their debts should the crop fail or be extraordinarily large.

Refused to Dissolve the Connection.—The Presbytery of Concord met at Davidson College on Thursday to consider the call which had been extended, Rev L McKinnon, for his services as pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church of Charlotte. A delegation was present from Concord to oppose the dissolution of Mr McKinnon's pastoral relations with the church at that place, while the prosecution of the call was warmly conducted by Messrs R I McDowell and J P Alexander, elders of the Charlotte Church.

After a lengthy debate, the Presbytery decided not to place the call in Mr McKinnon's hands unless he should signify his desire to accept it, and state that he believed it his duty to change his present field of labor for another. This he declined to do, and Presbytery then unanimously agreed that the relations which he now sustains to the church at Concord should not be dissolved.

This action of the Presbytery is a great disappointment to the members of the Second Presbyterian Church of this city. The congregation were united in asking for Mr McKinnon's services, and entertained little doubt that their request would be granted. He is eminently qualified for the work with which he would have met here, being thoroughly active and earnest in the holy work to which he has devoted his life. The work to which he is called, Mr McKinnon found at Concord, but his work there was in a very disorganized state; but his work there has been blessed in an extraordinary degree, and it is now in a highly flourishing condition. In view of these facts the congregation made a strong opposition to his leaving, and succeeded in retaining him.

The Commercial Bank.—This bank, of which Maj. C Dowd is President, will commence business during the 1st of next week. Their place of business for the present will be the room on South Trade street now occupied by Col D G Maxwell, who will move out this afternoon. The counter for the bank will be put up immediately, and it is expected that the institution will begin work on Monday afternoon or Tuesday morning.

ELECTRIC FLASHES. Four of the murderers of Senor Salvatierra, in the City of Mexico, a few days ago, have been captured and shot. Lerlo, President of Mexico, has arrived in the City of Mexico from his tour, and was received enthusiastically. There is no combination against him.

Senator Lewis, of Virginia, who has been home to recuperate his health, that returned to Washington, and although not yet in good health, is again in his seat in the Senate.

A Key West, Fla, dispatch says that the "Wabash," "Dispatch" and "Pinta" arrived yesterday from Havana. Admiral Case and a general signal that all reports be required to leave the fleet, and all correspondents thereupon left immediately.

The bill to repeal the social evil feature in the city charter of St. Louis, has been informally laid over in the State Senate. On motion of one of its prominent friends another bill was introduced yesterday.

The steampship "Graf. Bismarck" from Bremen, Feb'y 10, for the safety of which fears were entertained, arrived at New York this morning.

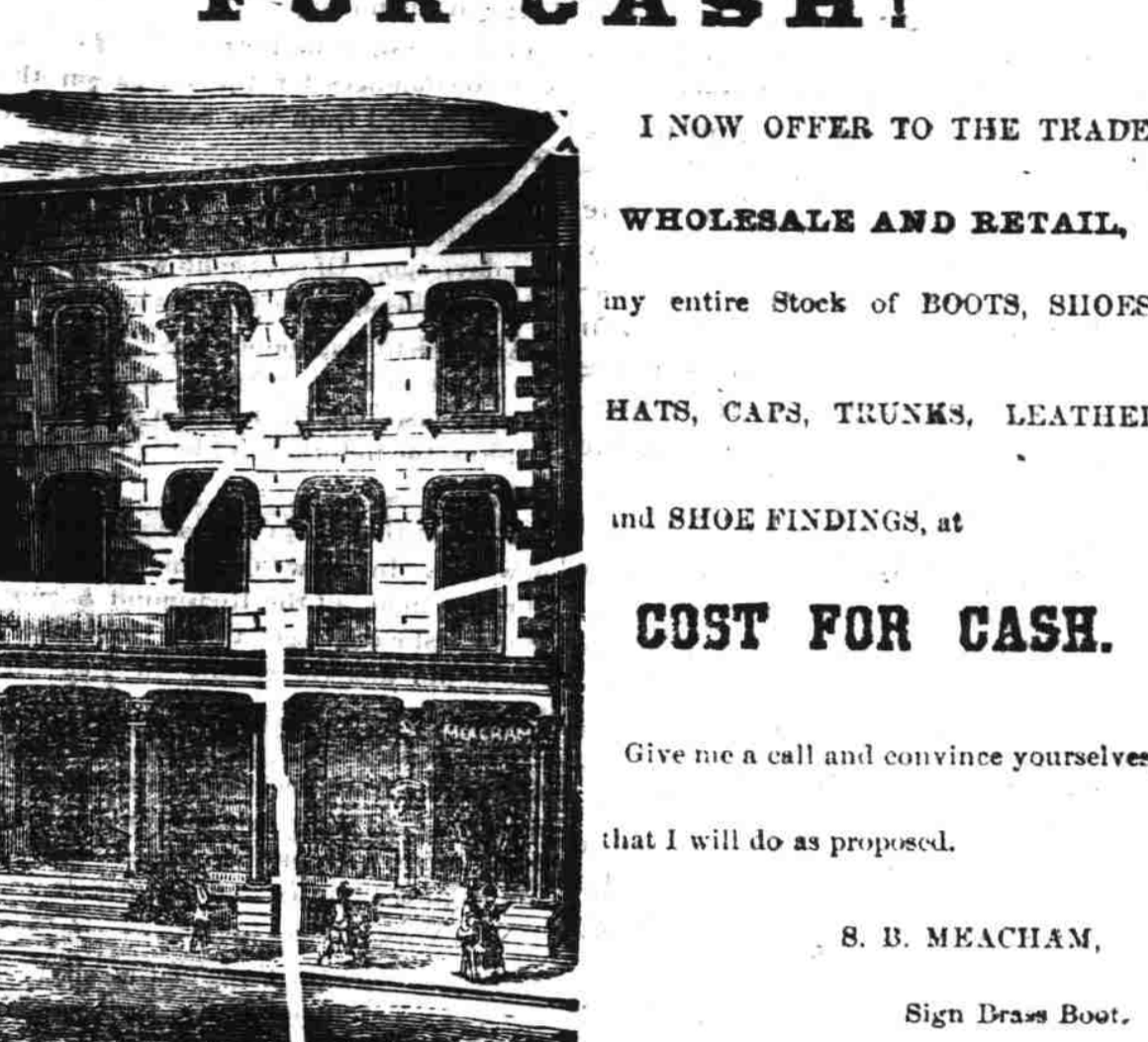
