NEW YORK

Ex-Sheriff Brennan Improving—Convicted of Stealing Certificates. New York, March 14.—Ex-Sheriff Brennan was taken a few days ago with congestion of the brain, and on Monday the physicians said he could live but a short time.

In the Court of General Sessions on yesterday, Thomas F. Maloney, indicted with his brother Michael, and Deputy Sheriff Lynn, for stealing 35,000 certificates from Burr S. Craft, of Virginia, on the 1st of December last, was found guilty and sentenced to four years in the State prison.

MASSACHUSETTS

Suicide from Insanity—The Whisky Being Consumed Quietly but Determinedly. WORCESTER, March 13.—F. A. Eldred, of the firm of Eldred & Liscomb, of this city, committed suicide this morning by cutting his throat. Insanity is supposed to be the cause.

The circulation of pledges has fairly begun here, and numerous parties of women yesterday visited upwards of twenty-five public places, hotels, drugstores, restaurants, groceries, &c., and presented pledges for signatures with but poor success, having obtained but two or three signatures. The movement is being conducted quietly but determinedly.

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OHIO

The Crusade not Accomplishing Much—An Editor in Court for Contempt. CINCINNATI, March 14.—The saloon keepers, of whom there are 2,600, held a meeting last night, and resolved to publish the names of all wholesale liquor dealers who are engaged, either personally or through the women, in the temperance crusade, in order that no friends of their shall make any purchases from them.

The visits of the committees of women to ask the druggists and others to sign the pledge is continued, but without much success. The women are followed by mobs of men and boys, and it is thought the movement will not go much further in this city.

In the trial of R. T. Scouden, the water works engineer of this place yesterday, John McLean, of the Enquirer refused to answer questions as to what other persons besides Scouden gave information on which the alleged libellous article was based. He was arrested for contempt and released on parole. It is understood that he will persist in the refusal, holding that, as the paper holds itself criminally and civilly responsible, he is not bound to divulge the sources of his information.

GERMANY

Defeat of the Government Proposition in Regard to the Army. BERLIN, March 14.—The German Reichstag has defeated the Government proposition fixing the strength of the army on an effective footing at 40,1650 men. The national liberals propose to fix the minimum strength of the army at 360,000.

SOUTH CAROLINA

A Negro Run Over by a Train Near Seneca City and Killed. SENECA CITY, S. C., March 14.—A colored man, name unknown, was found dead this morning about one mile and a half from this place, supposed to have been killed by the train. His body was badly mutilated.

MIDNIGHT DISPATCHES

GOTHAM

The Business of New York for the Week. NEW YORK, March 14.—Business during the week shows very little danger. The general features differ very little from those of last week. The agitation of financial affairs checks all large transactions. Cotton movements for the week, as compared with last, show a decrease in both receipts and exports. The market for cotton on spot has been dull with a downward tendency. Bread stuffs are more active, flour has met with an increased demand from all sources, wheat has showed a steady advance, provisions have been unsettled. Ocean-freights have been rather dull.

The following is the weekly bank statement: Deposits decreased \$1,000,000. Special decreased \$150,800. Legal tenders decreased \$2,500. Deposits decreased \$360,800. Circulation decreased \$180,900.

The Bank of England lost on balance to-day, 20,000 pounds sterling. It is reported in Berlin, that United States Minister Bancroft is about to be recalled to Washington at his own request, and it is also rumored that he will be succeeded by Dr. Jas. R. Thomson, of New York.

It was rumored on Wall street this evening that two well known firms have failed. Immediately after Woodhull, Claflin and Blood were released in the Court of General Sessions to-day, they were immediately re-arrested on a civil suit for libelling Challis.

Both Houses of the Missouri Legislature on yesterday passed resolutions in respect of the memory of President Filmore, Senator Sumner, and ex-Senator Wigfall.

THE WEST

One of the Truly Good. The "Reverend" Chaplain of the United States Senate has been again fulminating against the newspaper slanders.

He is a specimen of the prayers with which he soothes the asperities of his auditors, and prepares their hearts for the practice of forgiveness, charity and brotherly love.

Lord our God, we come into this place to deplore before Thee the spirit of lying which is abroad, and we beseech Thee to rebuke the giant demon of slander that stalks forth, casting upon the earth a fearful shadow. Palsy the tongue that utters wanton calumny, the things which tend to undermine all confidence in the good, and to give a malignant power to all the bad elements, for the demoralization and destruction of human society.

Let Thy flaming spirit take vengeance upon the false accuser, and consume this spirit of ruin from all the land. This we ask in the name and for the sake of Him who was truth itself.

Such prayers as this are to be repeated in the Senate Chamber, it would better that the office of chaplain be abolished. The discussions in the Senate are already sufficiently inflated; and it does not become the chaplain to pour out his own vials of venom to augment the bitterness. The cause of Christianity is certainly not promoted by such effusions. They only serve to increase the wonder that the cause of lives in spite of such ministers.

If the clerical denunciations will turn to the beautiful litany of the Episcopal church he will find a model to which he might conform his prayers without descending to the low vituperation of the political arena; and when he again calls for the interposition of divine power, instead of insulting his God by presuming to point out the proper victims of His vengeance, he will say: "That it may please Thee to forgive our enemies, persecutors and slanderers, and to turn their hearts." This mode would not only be in accord with the tenets of the faith he professes to practice, but, unless the Senators whom he addresses are a disgrace to the people they represent, it will be more acceptable to them. He is certainly mistaken if he supposes that God will condescend to become the agent for gratifying the malignant hatreds of every hoary scold and evangelical reviler who may call upon Him.

CONNECTICUT

Heavy Robbery in New Haven—Died from the Effect of the Shot. NEW HAVEN, March 14.—A man's express office in this city was broken into last night, and a safe containing notes, checks, drafts, greenbacks and fractional currency, to the amount of fifteen thousand dollars was carried off. The safe was taken to an alleyway in the rear of No. 6, Artisan Street, and blown open.

The burglars then took out the valuables and fled, leaving their tools, an empty powder flask, and some iron on the ground. The thieves obtained in cash less than \$12,000. The robbery causes great excitement here, and detectives are at work to find a clue to the thieves. Thus far no clue has been obtained.

LIQUOR

The Cleveland Women Go Forth With the Pledge for Signatures. CLEVELAND, O., March 14.—The women's temperance movement in this city assumed a more practical phase yesterday, when a large number of ladies assembled in the parlors of one of the principal churches, and after some time spent in prayer and consultation, some 50 of them started out in pairs, and proceeding to different sections of the city, canvassed for signatures to the general pledge, meeting with fair success.

An attack upon the saloons will probably be made next week. The crusade continues in most of the neighboring towns, and with a varying degree of success, but there seems to be no abatement of zeal and determination on the part of the ladies in any quarter.

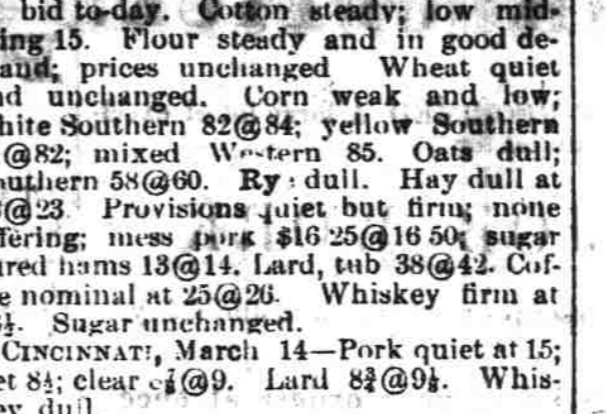
