Ripe Strawberries .- We saw the first ripe strawberry of the season yesterday. It was grown in the garden of Col D G Maxwell, of this place, and is of the Lenning white variety. It is different from the ordipary strawberry, being white instead of red when ripe, and lacks the delicate flavor of the red strawberry. Col Maxwell picked one ripe strawberry out of his garden last Sunday, and since that time quite a number of others have ripened.

Interesting Geological Specimen .-Through the courtesy of Jay Bundy, E-q., of this city, we have been permitted to see a curious and deeply interesting geological specimen, recently blasted out of a solid bed of rock in Boggan's Cut on the Carolina Central Railway. The specimen came from a depth of 30 feet under the surface of the earth. It consists of a piece of slate rock about 12 inches long, 6 wide, and 2 in thickness. On the face of the stone there is a clear, distinct, fine impression of a large piece of moss or fern-leaf, which no doubt was imprinted upon it in some remote geological period.

The specimen, which is quite a curiosity, can be seen at this office for several days.

Cotton for the Week .- During the past week the sales of cotton have been very light, only 508 bales having been sold during the whole six cays. The heaviest sales of the week were on Thursday, when 137 bales were sold . the lightest yesterday, when only 74 bales found their way into 28 a 30 market. The small sales are attributable to the facts that there is not now a great deal of cotton remaining in the country unsold; that the weather has been bad during 111 a 12 the greater part of the week and those who have cotton to sell could not conveniently get it to market. Some of the cotton sold last week came from as great a distance as Chester.

Prices have kept up well during the week. At 5 a 51 no time did the price for low middling fall below 151, and there has been a feeling of confidence and buoyancy perceptible in the market all the week. The market closed firm with good demand.

Disorderly House.-Ferguson & King, olored, who keep a bar-room on College street, between Trade and Fourth, were arraigned before the Mayor yesterday morning on the charge of keeping a disorderly house. There were quite a number of witnesses in the case, the witnesses being gentlemen who do business on the opposite side of the street and who have been much annoyed by the carryings-on in this bar-room. In view of the testimony the Mayor imposed a fine of \$5 and costs on the parties arraigned, and dismissed them with the warning that if any further complaint was made against the house, their license to retail liquor would be rescinded.

This establishment has long been an annoyance to the persons in that section of the city, and we are glad to know that steps have been taken to secure better order there. It may be that the threat to take away the license may have the effect to modify, to some extent, the drunkenness, profanity and general disorders which have hitherto held high carnival there, daily and nightly.

Row Among the Negroes .- Yesterday afternoon a strange negro named George Dean, reported to the Mayor that he had been set upon by a party of negroes near the Fair Grounds and beaten in a shameful manner by them. He showed the marks of violence upon his person, and upon his complaint a warrant was issued and placed in the hands of Constable Johnston, who arrested the men and brought them before His Honor. It appeared in evidence that the negroes arrested (there were nine of them) were drunk and had assembled in a clump of undergrowth in the lot opposite Green's store, on the way to the Fair Grounds to gamble. They became involved in a fight among themselves, & Dean, who was passing by at the time, interfered in the capacity of s peace maker, when he was set upon by the whole crowd and beaten as above stated. The principals in the affair, Sid Connor, Elijah Connor, Ed Owens, Bill Brown and John Kimbrall, were fined \$3.50 each and the crowd dismissed.

We understand that this place near the Fair Grounds is a favorite resort for negroes to meet together to gamble and drink.

Ride on a Cow-Catcher .- On Friday night while the mail train on the Air-Line Railroad was coming northward, and as the train was on a steep down grade, the engineer saw an ox standing across the track. Being too close to it then to slacken up, the engineer did not even blow brakes but went driving ahead. The train was running at the rate of fifty miles an hour, and as it struck the ox with fall force, it was supposed that it was knocked off the track and killed, and nothing more was thought about the

matter at the time. Proceeding about 80 miles further, what was the surprise of all who knew of it, to find the ox lying up on the top of the cowing out from the city in the direct catcher, as the train stopped at some station. It was left alone and the train proceeded onward. When it arrived at Charlotte the ox was taken off from its position, and found to be safe and sound. Imperfect Delivery.- We regret having o confess that there is still irregularity in the delivery of this paper, both at the morning trains, and to our city subscribers, We are doing all that is possible to systematize this part of our labors, and we promise that all irregularities shall be corrected. We consider it as one of the best possible evidences of the value of the OBSERVER to our readers that its failure to arrive on any morning is a noticeable fact. It convinces us, if indeed we needed any convincing, that our subscribers appreciate its value; and we promise that this appreciation shall be an incentive to greater diligence in ferreting out where the fault or blame lies.

The Mint. - One of the most interesting spots about Charlotte is the U S Branch Mint, under the charge of Col C J Cowles .-Here can be found all manner of curiosities from every part of the known world, and the antiquary can linger here for hours examining the different articles. We saw there yesterday more things than we could write of in a week. Among the most interesting were pieces of cloth out which were made the dresses of the females of the Sandwich Islands before Queen Emma's time; this cloth is of curious texture, being made from the bark of trees hammered out so as to be of about the thickness of this sheet of paper and of equal evenness. Then there were pieces knocked off from the Rock of Gibraltar, one cut into the shape of a Bible and another in the shape of a hymn book. A piece which had been knocked from the tomb of Virgil; the remains of a lamp- which was found in the ashes of Pompeii; sulphur which was taken from the burning mountain on the Sandwich Islands, and many, many other things of equal interest, some of them from distant lands and others from our own country. These specimens which we have mentioned as having come from other countries are genuine, having been given Col Cowles by a family connection who was for many years before the war in the naval service of the United States, and who has been nearly all over the civilized

An old coin which we saw at the mint is also interesting. It is a copper cent, made in 1783; on one side is the head of George Washington, surrounded by the words:-Washington & Independence;" on the other side : "Unity States of America-1." Dozens of things we saw there yesterday of which we cannot now speak, but which will prove of interest to any one who will take the trouble to call and examine them. Col. Cowles takes great pains in gathering together all sorts of geological specimens, and has now an assortment of which he may well be proud, and to which he is continually making additions. He was very kind yesterday in showing us his collection; for his polite attention our thanks are due.

We may at some future time give an account of the mint and the process by which its business is conducted.
