The Mecklenburg and Iredell county ponds, with the C. C. & A. R. R. bonds might bring seventy-five cents on the dollar if forced on the market, but this will fall short of meeting the floating debt, for which they are pledged, by forty thousand dollars.

Twenty-six thousand dollars of the floating debt with its accrued interest has nothing but the gold bonds as collaterals. The bond of the A. T. & O. R. R. amounting to \$100,000 held by Lancaster & Co., as a pledge for the \$65,000 sold by them, cannot be made available, for if forced on the market.
