The Business Men of Charlotte.

While the mercantile house of Wittkowsky & Rintels may be said to lead the trade in general lines of goods, some of our people have long since put on city airs and have established class establishments .-Messrs Brem, Brown & Co, for instance own a large iron front building 80 by 154 feet, three stories high, which is devoted exclusively to the hardware business. In addition to their present building they are now constructing another three story house to be used as an iron and nail warehouse, and general varehouse for shovels, forks, scales, coffee mills, general heavy hardware, and wooden ware, of which they expect hereaf-

ter to keep a heavy and well selected stock. This firm commenced business in 1866, on what was then considered a large capital, but so great has been the increase in business that it is now six times as large as it was for the first twelve months. They have drummers or salesmen in every corner of North Carolina, west of Durham's Station on the N C R R and in all of the upper half of South Carolina. They ship goods to every county in Western North Carolina except two or three. These are supplied in Knoxville, being much nearer to that point.

On the first day of January they were carrying a stock of goods amounting to \$49,-0018.00, and with this immense capital they have been able to buy from first hands at such close figures that they have been able to offer country merchants the best advantages of market in the State.

The past Spring they bought eight hundred dozen weeding hoes and twelve hundred sweeps to supply their trade.

During the past year they have sold 3,500 kegs of nails. They have also imported 1,-600 pocket knives, with an immense quantity of other English goods, direct from the manufacturers at Sheffield, as the bills on their files show.
