Railroad Matters—The Trial of a Railroad Forger—Railroad Matters—The Bricklayers, &c.

New York, June 20.—The meeting of first mortgage bond-holders of the New York and Oswego Midland Railroad was held yesterday evening for the purpose of receiving and taking action on the report of the Committee appointed on the 5th of May.

The trial of Andrew L. Roberts for forging Central Railroad Bonds, was resumed yesterday, and the case given to the jury. The Judge sent them word he would hear the verdict, if they had any, at 10 o'clock this morning.

Three crates of peaches from South Carolina, and as many from Georgia, were in market yesterday.

A number of the bond-holders of the Selma, Marion and Memphis R. R., assembled to-day at 10 A. M., in the office of Algernon S. Sullivan, on Wall Street. The object of the meeting was to free the line from the liens, one endorsed by the State of Alabama in 1869, and the other made in 1871.

In order that the bonds might become negotiable, Mr. White, the President, proposed a resolution that the old bonds be surrendered and new ones issued, which together meets the subscription promised from Shelby county and other districts, would enable the directors to complete the road and make it a paying concern.

Judge Brady opened Court this morning to receive the verdict in the Roberts' bond forgery case. At three o'clock this evening the jury had not agreed.

The testimony of the bricklayers and employers in regard to the strike of the men continues to be a source of contradiction. Mr. Thompson, Sec'y of the Bricklayers' Executive Committee says that 2,250 members of the Union are in regular standing in this city, and of this number only fifty-six had been reported as working for less than \$4 per day. One of the committee admitted that many journeymen masons had come to the city from the country, and are willing to work for what they could get. The Secretary considered this of little consequence.

News from Russia, England and France.

LONDON, June 20.—In the House of Commons yesterday, Mr. Bourke, Under Secretary of the Foreign Department, stated that the government was not unwilling to mediate between Brazil and the Agricultural Confederation, but it had not yet been invited.

The Times' Paris special says that the debate in giving the government the power to nominate Mayors will take place to-day, as the legitimists have promised to support the government. The latter may have a small majority when the measure comes to a vote.

Lacinubrun informed the committee of thirty yesterday, that the legitimists intended to again introduce in the Assembly a motion in favor of the restoration of the monarchy.

A special dispatch received here states that Gen. Garibaldi is seriously ill. He has become paralyzed and wholly helpless.

QUEENSTOWN, June 20.—The steamship "Montana," which sailed from New York on her first trip on June 15, put back to this port with her machinery disabled.

MADRID, June 20.—Senor Castells is quite ill to-day, and confined to his house. His illness is not considered of a dangerous type.

PARIS, June 30.—In the Assembly yesterday, an amendment to the municipal organization bill was adopted which completes the defeat of the measure. The amendment in effect maintains the existing system of municipal elections, striking out the clause which provides for a minority representation by cumulative ballots. It was adopted by a vote of 579 to 241, which caused great surprise. The withdrawal of the bill was announced. The Right is deeply discouraged by the recent votes in the Assembly. It feels that the power is gone and the majority which it has hitherto been able to command is broken up. The Left is determined to make a change in the domestic policy of the government.

The Communist-refugees in the city propose to entertain Rochefort at a grand dinner on Monday next. It is expected a large number of leading Communists will be present.

ROME, June 20.—The text of the address delivered by the Pope to the Cardinals on Sunday last is published. The Pope renews his protest against the usurpation of the Papal States, and other acts of the Italian Government, so that the enemies of the Church may not be able to plead the justification of undisputed custom. He is also moved to allude to these subjects again because he recently received overtures of reconciliation and had in his possession a respectful letter urging that, as the Vicar of the God of Peace, he should pardon his enemies and withdraw the excommunication pronounced against them; but he declared he could not make peace with the enemies of the Church.

and in conclusion exhorts the Cardinals to imitate the conduct of foreign bishops, especially those of Germany and France.

The American pilgrims who went to Vienna have left for Bavaria.

ILLINOIS Colored Masons in Session. CHICAGO, June 20.—The grand Lodge of the Colored Masons of Illinois were in session yesterday. The attendance was large.

IOWA Liquor Damages. CLOUTON, Iowa June 20.—The Supreme Court has returned a verdict of \$3,000 against a saloon keeper here, for selling liquor to a drunkard. The complainant was the wife of the victim.

MICHIGAN Death of Rev. Dexter Clay. BELLPORT Wis. June 20.—Rev. Dexter Clay, for many years State Agent, first pastor of the Congregational Church died on Thursday.

PENNSYLVANIA Had his Neck Broken by a Train. WILKESBARRE, Pa. June 20.—Harry Fisher, a miner, was struck by the 1.15 o'clock train this morning on the Lehigh Valley Railroad and had his neck broken.

OHIO Committed Suicide by Shooting. CINCINNATI, Ohio June 20.—E Marshall, of Boston, committed suicide at the Miller House this morning by shooting himself.
