In the review of the "Analogy," the writer after briefly noting the religious characteristics of the times in which it was written, and the general design of the whole work. confines himself, for illustrations of the easoning, to those chapters which deal with the objections to Christianity prevalent in Butler's day; and offers some observations on the method and the argument, especially with reference to Revelation and the Atonement. Though the reviewer does not accept the conclusions, he gives high praise to this standard text-book, and remarks that neither during his lifetime nor since has anything which can be called an answer to his Analogy been attempted."
