

Aspects and a Third Term.

It is quite amusing to observe with what energy Senator Morton and other Republican aspirants for the next Presidency, assume the problem of a "third term" candidacy. Those confessedly devoted friends of General Grant, who would do anything to favor his future good fortune, they are nevertheless compelled to oppose any aspirations he may possibly have for a "third term" upon the ground that it would be such a gross violation of the established customs of the country and examples of Washington and the Fathers as to seriously endanger the stability of the government. This is certainly a very sound argument and would come with very great force from the Democratic party of the country, and especially the State right portion of it. But to be urged by Morton or any other member of a party which, for the last fourteen years, has done nothing but violate every one of the principles of the written constitution at the time, it can only excite the derisive contempt of the world. All of their leading actions during and since the war were openly based, in the revolutionary language of their greatest leader, Stevens, upon purpose "above the constitution," and if they had no decent respect for the written constitution of the country, with the meets and bounds of federal power distinctly defined, how contemptible and dishonorable is it now for these great criminals to profess reverence or even respect for the unwritten customs and precedents of Washington or any other of the Fathers?

The motives of these ambitious demagogues in both instances are transparent. They did not hesitate to trample upon the "most sacred principles and plain letter of the written constitution when it served their base and revolutionary purposes to do so. They profess reverence now for the example and teachings of Washington, simply because it would seriously conflict with their schemes of personal ambition, not to force Grant into reference to such precedence. They are particularly jealous of Grant but do not care a far for either written or unwritten law. They know no law but the "higher law," and have no more scruples than the highway robber. For such men as these to talk about precedent, or attempt to fortify their positions by professed reverence for the teachings of the past, is simply the manifesto of unlimited hypocrisy and meanness, which Morton is fit to embody.—*Petersburg News*.
