The following denotes a few of the changes made in the postal regulations by the act of last session Letters with request to return printed or written thereon are to be returned without additional postage. When a subscriber to a newspaper changes his residence and de sires his paper forwarded to his new office transient rates of postage of one cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof must be charged on each copy as received. If a party receives a paper from the office of publication and remails it, he must pay pos-tage on it at the rate of one cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof. Letters once takenford the rest page while prop-er parties cannot be forwarded without being prepaid. This applies also to return request letters once taken out of a postoffice. Beena Hattle of Klippe Mountain. Lon Sunday, an excursion train for colored people left this city for Limestone Springs, on the Air Line Rainoad. There was quite a large growd on board, and they were met at their stopping, place by a crowd of colored people from Crowder's Mountain, and other places. When the time came for the departure of the crowd for Charlotte (the railroad station for Lithestone is Kings' Mountain) the negroes from Crowder's took possession of the coaches, and began all manner of profanity. They positively refused to get out, and in every way possible, rendered themselves disagreeable.

Finally, the Charlotte negroes resorted to extreme measures, and by main force, ejected one or two of the intruders from the cars. Then the row became general, and they tell us the revolutionary battle at Kings' Mountain wasn't a cock-fight compared with it .--Knives, sticks and pistols were used with a terrible cornesiness and effect; many a head had an indentation made in it, and many a human form divine got beaufifully carv-ed. Knives and pistols glistened like butnished silver in the rays of the declining sun, and blood flowed and trickled like mountain brooks.

We commend him for his honesty in his efforts to capture this coffee thief, and for his judgement in leaving
