Public School Funds. The general School Fund of North Caro ina was not designed as a sufficiency to carry on the schools, but was intended to be an encouragement to the people to add to it either by private contributions or local taxation, as evidence of which, the right is given to each county to levy a local tax by a maority of the votes of the county. And three trustees are appointed, a part of whose duty it is to solicit contributions to extend the school terms.
