The Carolina Military Institute.

On Friday evening, in company with the courteous Superintendent and Professor Lynes, we made a thorough inspection of the buildings and grounds of the Carolina Military Institute, which is a beautiful location, just on the southern outskirts of the city. The grounds are situated on a commanding eminence, overlooking a wide area of country, and a large portion of Charlotte, Stump-Town, particularly with its handsome residences, beautiful groves and flourishing gardens. South of the Institute, lie the Fair Grounds. In front runs the C. & A. Railroad. The lot consists of a perfect rectangle, lying parallel to the Railroad, and containing twenty-seven acres—the property of Messrs. Carson, Sanders and Alexander (S. B.), who are joint-owners of it. The grounds have been put in fine order; the scores of shade trees have been neatly trimmed, adding greatly to the appearance of things. A new plank fence has been built around that portion of the lot which has heretofore been unenclosed. Nothing has been left undone which would contribute to the neatness, elegance and convenience of the premises.
