Yesterday morning, Col. H. C. Jones, of this city, and Detective J. W. Gorson, of Philadelphia, arrived in Charlotte with W H, H. Houston, whose history for the past three months is so well known to our readers. The train was stopped at the crossing near the Charlotte Institute for Young Ladies, and there the party got off. Beveral gentlemen were there in waiting for them, and all proceeded at once to the jail, where. Houston was confined.

After breakfast he sent for Gov. Vance, to whose care he committed his case. A conference lasting two hours, was held by them in the presence of J. P. Houston, Esq , the prisoner's father, in the parlor of the jail, after which the prisoner was confined in a cell with Wm. C. Capps. He was visited during the day by some of his friends. It was decided after the conference ween Houston and his, coursel to submit the case and waive an examination. The amount of ball required has not yet been

fixed, and his friends say that when it is, it will be given and he will be released. The prisoner is in bad health and is looking badly. He is afflicted with rheumatism, and has lost 40 pounds in weight since he left Charlotte two months ago. He is downcast in spirits and is, altogether, a much had anni begind

There will be a full of the interest in this case now until the amount of the prisoner's ball is fixed, and it is ascertained whether or not he will be able to give it. This will be known semetime this week. The friends upon whom he relies to go on his bond live in Union county, and could not be gotten here yesterday. Railroad Accident. The mail train on the Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta Railroad, which leaves Charlotte at 8:30 A. M., going South, sustained an accident yesterday morning near Rock Hill. As well as the pass express cars, the engine was drwing two freight cars, or rather one freight and one stock car.

One of these two jumped the track, carrying some of the other cars with it, and making a considerable smash up of two or three of them. Mr. A. B. Mathias, the express messenger, had an arm sprained and was painfully hort; one of the train hands also received some injury, but no one except these two. The accident delayed the train until the mail train coming north last evening arrived; and the northern bound train was so delayed by the other as not to reach Charlotte untill an hour and a half behind
