New Buildings.

Seventy-five thousand bricks have already been laid on the Second Presbyterian Church, and the house is now ready for the first timbers. Mr P M Murray, who is building this and several other houses, has sent off for ten additional brick-layers.

The contract for the house to be put up by the Southern Life Insurance Company, has not yet been given out, as the plans and specifications have not been finished. These will be in the hands of the building committee in eight or ten days. The building, we understand, will be twenty feet higher than the Central Hotel, and will be the most elegant and expensive house in the

Another resolution was passed authorizing stockholders in the Carolina Central Railway Company to ride free to the annual meetings of said company.

mington Star of Thursday.

Rev. Daniel Lindley. This venerable man of God is now in Charlotte, and is the guest of J H Wilson, Esq. He has been for the past forty years, a missionary in the wilds of Africa, and only a short time ago returned to his native country I ong years ago, when he was a very young preacher, Mr. Lindley, hen a citizen of Pennsylvania, accepted a call to take charge of the Presbyterian church at Rocky River, Cabarrus county, in this State, succeeding the lamented Rev Dr Wilson. This was before there was any organized missionary society in the United States as there is at present, but a call was made by the churches throughout the country for young men to enter the missionary field, and Mr. Lindley, who had then been in

charge of his church but a short time, was prompt in responding to the call. Passing through Richmond, Va., he married here a lady, who was a comparative if not an entire stranger to him, and who, leaving home and friends, cleaved to him, and went with him to a land she knew not, except that it was a land of barbarians and of hoary superstitions.

A brother of Mr J H Wilson, and his wife, accompanied Mr Lindley and his wife to Africa. Both of the latter died, however after a short residence there. Mrs. Wilson in three months after her arrival, and hes husband eight or nine months later.

Mr. and Mrs. Lindley raised a family of eleven children, all of whom the mother educated, in addition to teaching the heathen. Mr. Lindley's ministry was eminently successful, and he saw many souls converted to the faith of the Christian religion. When, by his own increasing age, and the failing health of his wife, he was forced a few months ago to take his departure from Africa, he was succeeded in his ministry by the eldest son of the King in whose dominions he had ministered.

When he took charge of Rocky River church, Mr. Lindley became a member of concord Presbytery. His name has never been taken off the rolls of the Presbytery; at each one of its meetings during all those forty years, the name of Daniel Lindley was called, and for the first time during that period he responded to it in Morganton about a month ago.

Mr. Lindley's conversation is, as can well be imagined, entertaining, and edifying.-To-morrow and to-morrow night he will speak at the First Presbyterian church here, on Africa and Africans, and his work while among those heathenish people. We feel sure that it will be to a crowded house, and that many persons who now think that contributions to the missionary cause is money spent for nought, will have cause to change

A Paper of the Olden Time.

We are recommended in our national bill of rights to a frequent recurrence to first principles; and while we will not now recur to such ancient matters, it is still an old and an interesting subject. Our young friend, Tommie Andrews, has brought us bound volumes of the Mecklenburg Jeffersonian, of 1841 and '42. It is about the size of the DAILY OBSERVER, and was published and edited by Joseph W. Hampton. In the year 1842, a lively canvass was going on over the Governorship. John M. Morehead, of Guilford, was the Whig candidate, and Louis D Henry, of Cumberland, the Democratic The Democratic county ticket was, for the Senate, John Walker; for the House, John Kirk, Dr. Jos. W. Ross and Caleb Erwin The Jeffersonian was red hot Democratic, and it abused the Whigs almost as badly as Democratic ocratic papers of the present day abuse the carpet-baggers and scalinwags.

One of the most interesting articles we

find on glancing through the file, is an account of "the celebration of the 4th of July, '42, in the village of Charlotte." Maj. Benj. Morrow was chief marshal of the day, and his assistants were Samuel A. Harris, Joshua Trotter, Joseph Sumner and Alexander Be-thune. In front of the residence of Mr. Schools at 4 P M, in that church. Improvements now being made in the city. John R. Bolton, the procession stopped, and

was presented with a handsome temperano banner, by Miss Amanda Bolton; the banner was received, and its presentation duly acknowledged by James W. Osborne. The banner was borne in front of the procession by two men, who " felt proud of the honorable appellation of 'reformed drankards,' to the Presbyterian Church, where, after prayer by Rey. James M. Thomas, Dr. Chas. J. Fox read the national declaration of independence. Then, Mr F H McDowell delivered an eloquent address.

After the speaking, a public dinner was had at the Mansion House, of which Timothy R Hughes was proprietor. Dr Stephen R Fox presided at the dinner, and here speeches were made and toasts drunk by James H Orr, Benj Morrow, H B Williams, Maj Joseph Smith, Dr J M Happoldt, Col E

Brem, Dr CJ Fox, Alexander Bethune, Rev Mr Freeman, Mr Blackwood, and many others. Nearly all these speeches were on the subject of temperance; a temperance fever seemed to be raging in the village at this

At the time of this publication, the present Charlotte Hotel was the "Carolina Inn," and Jennings B Kerr was the proprietor. S D Nye Hutchinson was principal of the Charlotte Female Academy, and T A Alexander was Sheriff of the county.

Mr R M Herron, the present esteemed foreman of the Observer, learned his trade on the Jeffersonian, beginning when he was a very small boy; and the sight of these old Gail & Ax's Suarity, Superior and Comvolumes brought many incidents of these times to his lips.

When the old and faded pages which lie open before us as we write this, came damp from the press, Charlotte was but a hamlet. We are told that, where Trade and College streets now intersect, was then yirgin forest, and that the whole size of the village was not as great as half of one of the present wards. In the space of 30 years, it has sprung into a magnificent little city, when, 30 years ago, it was hardly known of 50 miles rom its own corporate limits.

These are interesting papers, and we could cull from their columns, many items which would interest our readers this morning; but we cannot pursue the subject further at
