### Pleasant Words for Our Fair.

It is evidently gotten up with much care, and with a purpose to carry out in good faith all that is proposed. The officers of the Association are some of the best men in Mecklenburg county, and with such names at the head, failure is impossible if the farmers and mechanics of the county do their full duty. The interest, energy and enterprise manifested by the citizens of Charlotte deserves success, and we hope and believe they will achieve it this year. Gov. Vance will deliver the annual address."

### New Buildings.

Seventy-five thousand bricks have already been laid on the Second Presbyterian Church, and the house is now ready for the first timbers. Mr. P. M. Murray, who is building this and several other houses, has sent off for ten additional brick-layers.

The contract for the house to be put up by the Southern Life Insurance Company, has not yet been given out, as the plans and specifications have not been finished. These will be in the hands of the building committee in eight or ten days. The building, we understand, will be twenty feet higher than the Central Hotel, and will be the most elegant and expensive house in the city.

The brick masons are progressing very well with the store of Alexander, Seigle & Co., and are great white, the brick work will be completed.

The most durable of all the buildings which have been put up this season, is that of Sanders & Blackwood, on College Street. The walls are thick and substantial, the supports large, and of the best material, and the "sleepers" are such as that a train of cars could almost be run over them.

The store built by Dowd and Sims is about finished as to the brick work. It is three stories high, and stands high above all the business houses around it. It will make an excellent and convenient business house.

There is little brick work to be done on the store of R. P. Smith. This will have an iron floor, and be a handsome house.

The above-named are the most noticeable improvements now being made in the city.

### A Prospect of Arms at Last.

Col. J. P. Thomas, Superintendent of the Carolina Military Institute in this city, yesterday received a communication from Gen. John C. Gorman, Adjutant General of the State, wherein he states that he has made a requisition upon the authorities at Washington for arms for the Institute. These arms will consist of 100 breech-loading rifle muskets with accoutrements, and a necessary number of sergeants' swords. Gen. Gorman writes that he expects these arms in Raleigh in a few days, and that as soon as they arrive, he will forward them to Charlotte.

We are glad to know that after a pro-secution for which there appeared to us no good excuse, the Adjutant General and Governor have taken steps toward complying with a request which was filed with them months and months ago.

### Meeting of Stockholders of the Carolina Central Railway.

In accordance with previous notice a special meeting of the stockholders of the Carolina Central Railway Company was held at the office of the company, in this city yesterday morning.

The meeting was organized by calling Col. S. L. Fremont to the chair and requesting Capt. I. B. Granger to act as secretary.

A resolution was offered and adopted, authorizing the Board of Directors to exchange the common stock of the Carolina Central Railway Company with corporate holders as well as individual holders (to whom stock has been issued) for equivalent stock in the late Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford Railroad Company.

Another resolution was passed authorizing stockholders in the Carolina Central Railway Company to ride free to the annual meetings of said company.

Also a resolution directing the printing of the records of each annual meeting of the stockholders of the company in pamphlet form.

Messrs. S. N. Martin and J. W. Leak comprised the Committee on Proxies.—Wilmington Star of Thursday.

### Rev. Daniel Lindley.

This venerable man of God is now in Charlotte, and is the guest of J. H. Wilson, Esq. He has been for the past forty years, a missionary in the wilds of Africa, and only a short time ago returned to his native country. Mr. Lindley, when he was a very young preacher, accepted a call to take charge of the Presbyterian church at Rocky River, Cabarrus county, in this State, succeeding the lamented Rev. Dr. Wilson.

This was before there was any organized missionary society in the United States as there is at present, but a call was made by the churches throughout the country for young men to enter the missionary field, and Mr. Lindley, who had then been in charge of his church but a short time, was prompt in responding to the call.

Passing through Richmond, Va., he married there a lady, who was a comparative if not an entire stranger to him, and who, leaving home and friends, cleaved to him, and went with him to a land she knew not, except that it was a land of barbarians and of heathen superstitions.

A brother of Mr. J. H. Wilson, and his wife, accompanied Mr. Lindley and his wife to Africa. Both of the latter died, however, after a short residence there. Mrs. Wilson in three months after her arrival, and her husband eight or nine months later.

Mr. and Mrs. Lindley raised a family of eleven children, all of whom the mother educated, in addition to teaching the heathen. Mr. Lindley's ministry was eminently successful, and he saw many souls converted to the faith of the Christian religion. When, by his own increasing age and the failing health of his wife, he was forced a few months ago to take his departure from Africa, he was succeeded in his ministry by the eldest son of the King in whose dominions he had ministered.

When he took charge of Rocky River church, Mr. Lindley became a member of concord Presbytery. His name has never been taken off the rolls of the Presbytery; at each one of its meetings during all those forty years, the name of Daniel Lindley was called, and for the first time during that period he responded to it in Morganton about a month ago.

Mr. Lindley's conversation is, as can well be imagined, entertaining, and edifying.—To-morrow and to-morrow night he will speak at the First Presbyterian church here, on Africa and Africans, and his work will among those heathen people. We feel sure that it will be to a crowded house, and that many persons who now think that contributions to the missionary cause is money spent for nought, will have cause to change their minds.
