INDIANA

INDIANAPOLIS, October 14.—This city and Marion county give Democratic majorities. The State is probably Democratic by 10,000. Returns are meagre.

MISSOURI

Election returns come in slow, the ticket being very long and the scratching vigorous. The Democrats probably elect the State, but the legislators are in doubt. The Democrats gained two or three Congressmen. In this State 16,000 votes were cast; 3,000 more than ever before.

Second Despatch.—On account of the length of the ticket and the unusual number scratched, ballot count everywhere have been tedious. In the first District W. Heilman, Rep., is elected. This District was represented by the black Dem. of Vincennes in the last Congress. In the 2nd District Wm S Halmon Dem., every there was ahead of his Hinkle, Rep., who had doubt elected; in the third District M C Kerr, the regular Democratic candidate is elected over Jas A Craver, Independent Democrat, by about 122 majorities. The result on the State ticket cannot be given, but it will be very close.

GEORGIA

SAVANNAH, October 14.—The Republican opposition to the Congressional nominee, Bryant, held a mass meeting on Court House square this evening. A majority of those present were white and colored people of the better class. Tunis G. Campbell, State Senator, and leader of the anti-Bryant men, made a scurrilous onslaught on the ring, as he designated the Convention who nominated Bryant, and charged him with being the cause of the defeat of the Republican party at the coming election for Representatives for the 2nd District.

A fire broke out in Sheddor's upper Range, by street, in the office of Ernest, Beyer & Co., which threatened for a time being of great consequence, being in the heart of the cotton business of the city. The prompt presence of the Washington Steam Fire Engine, soon extinguished the flames. With a loss of about \$2,000 in cotton samples, burned and damaged; to the building \$5,000, covered by insurance. The cause of the fire was striking a parlor match to kindle a fire in the stove, some of the flint-striking powder lodging in the cotton samples placed against the walls.

OHIO

CINCINNATI, October 14.—Out of 37,000 votes, with 20 precincts to hear from, Bell, Democrat, for Secretary of State, has 4,500 majority; Sayre, Democrat, for Congress in the 1st District, has 4,200 majority over Green; Barning, Democrat, in the 2nd District, has 1,200 majority over Stewartson.

The chairman of the Republican Executive Committee, concedes the election of the Democratic State ticket. The Enquirer's special claims the State Democratic by 25,000. The Democrats have twelve out of twenty Congressmen. Returns from all parts of the State, indicate that the Republicans are defeated on the entire State ticket, and four of the Congressmen. For the Democratic, 1,500 majority; for Witza, 1,000 majority; for Hand, 1,000 majority.

SOUTH CAROLINA

GREENVILLE, October 14.—General Kershaw addressed a large audience here this morning and again to-night, he spoke to a tremendous crowd in torch light procession. He was followed by Hon. H. V. Miller, of Georgia, in a most telling speech. Salinan closed the proceedings in an eloquent address, appealing with great power to whites and blacks to rally to the support of Green and DeLaney and thus secure an honest Government for South Carolina. The whole up country is alive with enthusiasm for Green.

NEW YORK, October 14.—Rudolph challenges Garnard, to a three ball game of billiards for the championship and a silver cup.

A World Columbian special claims the State Democratic by 10,000 majority.

A World Indianapolis special claims that Indiana has gone Democratic, but the majority has not yet been ascertained.

World Des Moines special concedes that State to the Republicans by 20,000 majority.

WEST VIRGINIA

WHEELING, October 14.—Owing to the lack of telegraphic facilities, no definite returns from the State can be obtained. Officials returns from about half the counties indicate that the Republicans have carried the first District. The second and third Districts are claimed by both parties. The returns received from the second District are favorable to the election of the Democratic candidates.

UTAH

SALT LAKE CITY, October 14th.—Brigham Young and leading Hunsar-chians, made a profane apology to Marshall Maxwell yesterday, for an assault made on him the previous day, and produced men who had made the assault. The lawyer, who examined before Commissioner Tohey, and held in \$5,000 bonds. The church papers offer apology for the outrage.

MICHIGAN

DZANDR, October 14.—The woman's suffrage Convention assembled yesterday. Resolutions were adopted affirming equal rights. Man and woman implies the same laws for husband and wife, widow and widower. Equal education, industrial opportunities, equal pay, equal work, and a voice in the Government were demanded.

FOREIGN

BERLIN, Oct. 14.—The Government is preparing a bill for submission to Parliament, which meets on the 18th, providing for embodiment in times of war of a separate force, called "landwehr," to be composed of those not included in the line of reserve on "landwehr."

It is stated that Pauline Lecca will shortly retire from the stage, having purchased a villa at Lake Zurich, where she proposes residing quietly.

LONDON, Oct. 14.—The efforts of the Bank of France to prepare for a return to specie, attracts great attention here. The amount of 20 France notes outstanding is twenty million pounds sterling, which is slowly withdrawn as the Bank has increased its stock of bullion during the present year to about eight hundred million sterling. The rate of subscription will, it is feared, shortly made to a sharp rise in the price of money.

PARIS, Oct. 14.—The numerous disasters of French vessels, have resulted in the adoption of a decree in the official Journal, directing that signals "Belton" and "Erbord" on merchant ships, should henceforth indicate the desire to be taken and not the movements by the great of the sea.

LONDON, October 14th.—The Grand Duchesse Marie is now quite recovered from the effects of her late accident at the Bois de Boulogne.

THE official remonstrance of the Spanish Government concerning the alleged violation of the neutrality laws by France are the subject of anxious consideration in the Cabinet. The Duke DeCazes, minister of foreign affairs, is fully alive to the leaning of the Spanish official note, but is believed to preserve an equanimity, and if possible will adjust the matter without compromising the Government.

IOWA

DES MOINES, October 14.—Returns indicate that the State is Republican by 40,000 majority. Republican Congressmen's majorities have been reduced. The Grangers voted politically, not as body. All the Republican Congressmen elected.

VIRGINIA

WHEELING, W. VA., October 14th.—Cobb, Republican, in the First District, Butler, Republican, in the Second, elected; Third District uncertain. The general result is not yet known.

ILLINOIS

SPRINGFIELD, October 14th.—Senator Logan and General Sherman have arrived to participate in unveiling the Lincoln statue. The President is expected to-day.

TENNESSEE

MEMPHIS, October 14.—Davis, who turned State's evidence in the case of the Trenton jail breakers, was brought on a writ of attachment and placed under \$2,500 bonds.

OMAHA, October 14th.—The returns now indicate that the Republican State ticket has about 4,000 majority.
