The most exciting event on the streets yesterday, was the chase of a loose country cow which had been brought to town for sale, conducted by a man on horse back and another on foot. Crowds of people collected in the streets to witness the race, and bets were offered two to one in favor of the cow.

New Instruments Received.

The Charlotte Cornet Band has received its new silver instruments, and they were opened last evening in the hall over the Market House. They are very fine and beautiful. These instruments were a paid for by the members of the band, excepting about \$100, which yet remains unpaid. It would be a handsome thing if the Board of Aldermen would meet this claim when it comes due.

The Synod at Concord.

We learn from a gentleman just returned from Concord, that the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of the State, in session in that town at present, is quite largely attended by ministers, elders and visitors. Rev. Daniel Lindley delivered a lecture on Africa before the Synod on Friday night. The discussions on the various topics which come before the body are, our informant says, of an unusually interesting character.

Carolina Military Institute.

This institution, which began its second year on the 1st instant, has now 190 cadets. Of these 80 are boarders, and only 20 from the city of Charlotte—day cadets. Colonel Thomas is sanguine that, by the 1st of January, he will have over 100 boarders and 130 cadets. This school now has a larger number of cadets and a larger number of boarders than any similar school in the State. We are sorry, however, that it is not meeting with greater encouragement from the citizens of Charlotte.

Obtaining Money by Fraud.

Yesterday afternoon Justice Martin issued an order of arrest for negro named Alfred Lord, who has a stall in the Market House, for obtaining money by fraudulent practices. It appears that an old negro, named Joseph Jackson, who, hails from the country, allowed Lord to act as his agent to sell a cow belonging to him to the show boys to feed the animals upon. The show boys, who are Lord's customers, were told that the cow was to be turned over to their hands at once. The work was placed in the hands of an officer, but Lord secreted himself, and has not yet been found.

The Mayor's office was idle yesterday.

There hasn't been a case before the Mayor from the Five Points in two days.

The Board of Aldermen will meet in regular session to-morrow night in the hall over the Market.

During the week ending last night there were six police arrests—one white person and five colored.

Rev. G. B. Wetmore delivered an address on the subject of temperance at Sugar Creek Church yesterday, and organized a Council of Friends of Temperance, with thirty-three applicants for charter. Mr. Wetmore is a zealous and energetic worker in the cause.
