A number of persons were arrested Saturday evening to vote on the registration of the State. The votes polled up to noon are exceedingly high. It is generally admitted that George W. Jones can secure no regular delegate Jones, Republican or German voter cast almost unopposed for Gudger for Mayor.

The audience in the election appears to be divided among itself in different districts. The ticket does not obtain much attention. The tickets for the various political amorphous are generally thrown away by voters in this city, and probably there will not be many to cast at that quarter. The indications are that the Democrats will carry all the Congressional Districts, and also the short term vacancies, in the city of New York.

In the 5th Congressional District Edward Hogan, independent Democrat, is running ahead of the Tammany Democratic candidate and will probably be elected. Jones, Republican and People's Liberal candidate for register, gained greatly on the Republican vote in the stronghold of Hayes, Tammany candidate. There is no doubt of Jones' election, to be sure made.

The contest in the 6th Assembly District is very bitter. The first 5 wards of the city polled a heavy vote for Tilley or Gudger.

John McKeon, the victim of Corcoran Crocker, died last night 10 o'clock, yesterday.

The contest between James O'Brien and Abram H. Hewitt, both running as Democratic candidates for Congress, culminated in a tumult yesterday. A gun was fired, a bullet standing between two men who were fired, and resolved a mortal wound.

EUFALA, ALA. Nov. 3.—A serious riot occurred here today, in which two whites and thirteen negroes were killed.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. Nov. 3.—A serious disturbance occurred here to-day. It was brought on by a lot of negroes, who attempted to coerce some of the Conservative voters. The disturbance was finally quelled by the citizens.

CAVANAH, MO. Nov. 3.—The Democrats have carried this city by over 3,000 majority. The negroes generally voted the Democratic ticket.

CHARLESTON, S. C. Nov. 3.—It is generally believed that the Independent Republicans have beaten the Radical ticket in this city.
