This is correct as to the racing, but the gambling was astonishingly unsuccessful, very few, if any of the gamblers, having made enough to pay expenses.

**Knight Templars.**  
The annual meeting of the Grand Lodge of the Knight Templars of the United States will take place at New Orleans on the 8th inst. On the 28th, three hundred members of the organization will pass through Charlotte; their agent was here a few days ago, and made arrangements to have them dine at the Central Hotel on that day. They will arrive over the North Carolina Railroad in five Pullman sleepers and a number of passenger cars. From here they proceed via the Air-Line, remaining only about two hours.

**Potatoes at the Fair.**  
We failed in our reports of the articles on exhibition at the Fair, to notice as fully as we should have done, two displays of Irish potatoes. One was a basket full of the early rose, which were raised by Mrs. J. W. Little, of Anson county, in one, from one potato, the seed of which was planted in February. They were dug in July, and some of the crop planted. This, therefore, is the second crop of the year, and the crop of this one hill was 16 potatoes, of various sizes, some of them quite large.

**Another exhibition of potatoes was by Mr. Frank Snider, of this city. They are also the second crop of the year, the first having been planted in February and the second in August.**  
These prove to us that in this county, we can raise two crops of potatoes per year as easily as one.

Their first meetings should take place, beginning on the 20th of May and continue for 3 days, and the next the last Tuesday of October. Also for 3 days, to be continued thereafter semi-annually, last day of each term to be appointed for sale of stock. X

**[COMMUNICATED.]**  
**EDITOR OF THE OBSERVER:—**  
My attention has been recently called to an article in the OBSERVER, in which it is stated that I had been arrested and committed to the jail of Rowan county, charged with having murdered Osear L. McFee. This charge is utterly false, and what was the motive of your informant in attempting to prejudice the public mind against me I know not, unless it be to poison public sentiment against me to such an extent that I may be convicted in the Federal Court at Statesville upon the groundless charge of passing counterfeit currency. Who your informant is, I know not, but am satisfied that the charge originated with one Charles E. Anichini, a detective in the service of the Treasury Department. The man is an unnaturalized foreigner, an Italian by birth, education and instinct, who without character or any other quality than those common to his countrymen, has acquired position under the Government. As to the character of this fellow, I have only to say at the late term of the Federal Court held at the late term of the Federal Court held at Statesville, two men were placed on their trial for passing counterfeit money, and the only issue presented was whether Anichini was to be believed or not. He had testified to every fact necessary to establish the guilt of the defendant, and with a jury of more than ordinary intelligence and moral worth they by their verdict, said that Anichini could not be believed. His object has been to poison the public mind against me and other gentlemen, who have been indicted upon his testimony and other witnesses of a little character as himself. At the first term when I was indicted, I insisted upon a trial. This was denied me, and this too when the witness McFee was present in court, and when so far as I know all the government witnesses were present. This of itself proves the falsity of the charge that I regarded McFee as a material witness against me. At the last term of court I again demanded a trial, and insisted that I should not be held under heavy bonds for my appearance, when I had at all times been ready, able and willing to meet any charges which had been preferred against me through the active interposition of this Italian detective, who has as little knowledge of justice, as he has of American institutions; but this was again refused. And to make my condition as intolerable as my enemies could, some of them got you to circulate through your paper the foul and infamous libel that I had murdered McFee. The Grand Jury of Rowan county have just closed a session and I am informed that a most thorough examination, not the shadow of a shade of suspicion was thrown upon me or any of the other persons jointly indicted with me. This fellow Anichini and his associates, who were so anxious to injure me that to forget the real murderer of McFee, seem to designate follow a false scum. Why not get after the man last seen with McFee, who under a false name was travelling with him, and who was heard to say that McFee had when he left his house from one hundred to three

hundred dollars, and afterwards said when he left, he had not a cent, and when the body was found it had no money, but only the knife of a fellow traveller? When are we to get rid of these oppressive acts of the Federal Government. Only last week at Statesville a witness for the government who had been detained at home by sickness voluntarily came to court when he was seized with a capias and incarcerated in jail because he could not give bail, which could be justified in the sum of three thousand dollars! Oh! justice how many crimes are committed in thy name.

I have no cause to complain of Judge Dick who on occasions has shown himself to be an upright Judge, willing to administer justice impartially, but I have a right to complain of any one who will publish the infamous slanders of such men as Anichini, not content with giving publicity to this charge through the press. I am informed that he was on the court green at Statesville sedulously circulating the report that I and those jointly indicted with me, were McFee's murderers. I am ready to meet these charges at any time and when my trial takes place at Statesville I know I shall be as triumphantly acquitted as that Anichini and his hirelings will be disappointed.
