Three or four difficulties of very serious nature occurred; the knife and pistol figured conspicuously, and three or four parties made narrow escapes from death. There seems to have been no good reason for the occurrence of any of the troubles, and nearly if not quite all of them are traceable to too much benzine. First in order, came Philo Reid, who got shot by Frank Morrow; both the parties are colored; Reid was shot in the neck, and it was thought for a time that the wound was a fatal one, he is up and about new, however, though the ball has not been extracted. Jim Torrence was cut in the arm by Gus Dunlap. The wound was a severe one, and the man bled profusely. In addition to these, George Davidson was cut by Thos. Symons, though not in a dangerous manner.
