New Orleans, the cotton port of the United States, is only th of a cent ahead, and the cost of transportation from Charlotte to sea port will make our market, higher in proportion than any place we know of. In this con-nection we will say that good cotton was sold in Salisbury last week, for eight cents which our informant thought would have brought at least 131 in this market. So much for railroad competition, cotton orders and the pluck of our cotton men.
